CIC MEETING

FORT KLAMATH—The regular bi-monthly meeting of the Civic Improvement Club was held Friday afternoon, July 18, in the clubhouse. Mrs. Harold L. Wimer, president, conducted the meeting.

At the next club meeting, which falls on August 1, the Klamath County chest x-ray mobile unit will be at the clubhouse at 2 p.m. (PST) to 8 p.m.

Free x-rays will be available to all persons over 15; those over 65 being especially urged to take this opportunity for chest x-rays, as people in this age category are more susceptible to heart trouble and cancer as well as tuberculosis, and all three may be detected by means of chest x-rays.

Residents of this locality who are eligible include those living as far as Fort Creek to the south and Crater Lake National Park people to the north of Fort Klamath.

Chairman in charge of all arrangements is Mrs. James Van Wormer who will be assisted by Mrs. Don Vesich Mrs. Loren L. Miller Jr. Others will be appointed in the near future.

It was decided at this time that the club would sponsor two local donors a month to the Bloodmobile in Klamath Falls transportation to be furnished those wishing to give blood. In charge of this project are Mrs. Raymond S. Loosley and Mrs. William Brewer.
