Bomber Ends Bout In Ninth

Beatty's Ralph Weiser bombed out Jerry (Spider) Renaud last night at the Armory with a savage two-punch attack that left the Portland boy battered and unconscious at the end of the ringers at the end of the ninth round.
The fight goes down in the books as a 10th round TKO for Weiser and gives him recognition—at least unofficially—as "Oregon's best lightweight."
Weiser, his face smeared with blood from Renaud's rapid-fire left jab, caught Renaud with a left to the body near the ropes and followed it with a right to the jaw that sent Renaud tumbling out of the ring simultaneously with the bell that ended the ninth round.
Renaud's seconds threw in the towel. But they wouldn't have had to. Referee Wally Moss would have stopped the wild brawl that saw Renaud fall six times, one time after the eighth round bell, a matter that cost Weiser that round.
But there was little doubt of the outcome soon after the first bell sounded.

Oakland made good use of the home run to take the first game in extra innings and the same weapon capped the nightcap.
At the end of the regulation seven innings of the opener, the score stood 4-4. San Francisco went ahead 5-4 in the tenth, but Lloyd Christopher tied the count with a homer in the Oaks' half. Then Oakland loaded the sacks and Center Fielder Sam Chapman singled in the winning run.
SPIDER HORNSEN socked two round trippers in the nightcap and Christopher came through with another.
Meanwhile Hollywood, which had won 13 of its last 14 games, fell apart in the field and committed four errors responsible for six unearned Sacramento runs. Manager Joe Gordon helped his club's cause with two homers. His four master in the ninth highlighted a four-run rally that led the contest.
San Diego, the leader, through the first half of the season, continued to slip as Fred Sanford did a neat handoff job for Portland in taking his 12th victory of the campaign. After hurling shutout ball for eight innings, he needed help in the ninth when the Padres threatened to rally.

GREENWOOD LAKE, N. Y. (AP)—Straining for the sound of the bell that will cut him loose against Harry Matthews Monday night at Yankee Stadium, Rocky Marciano winds up his training camp work Saturday.
Nobody is tipping his hand on the battle plan of the unbeaten Brockton, Mass., slugger with 36 knockout victories in 41 fights. But there is a strong suspicion that he will come out swinging from the first bell, shooting for an early crusher.
The winner gets Jersey Joe Walcott for the world heavyweight championship in September. But the winner will be more attractive if he is an early knockout winner.
"It all depends on what the other guy does," said Charley Goldman, Harry's trainer. "If he runs, we'll have to catch him. If he stands still and fights, Rocky will be ready."
The sturdy slugger, bronzed by a six-week conditioning program, wasn't quite so evasive.
"I'm going after him as soon as I can," he said. "No waiting. As soon as I find an opening, I'll shoot the works. That's what I always do."
Joey Maxim, the light heavyweight king, picked Marciano to win by a knockout on his brute punching strength.

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Indians Rise, NY Falter

The Cleveland Indians, counted out as a pennant threat early this week, are back in business once again.
When the league-leading New York Yankees dumped the Indians 7 1/2 games off the pace by sweeping a doubleheader Tuesday, it looked like curtains for the Tribe.
But the Indians bounced back, knocking the Yanks off twice. Friday night they whipped Washington, 4-2, and took over third place from the Senators, 4 1/2 games behind New York and only 1/2 back of second place Boston.
The Yanks, meanwhile, suffered their third straight loss as they bowed to the Tigers in Detroit, 2-1. The Red Sox remained four games astern of the Bombers by dropping a 3-2 squeaker to the St. Louis Browns. The Philadelphia Athletics and Chicago White Sox divided a two-night doubleheader, the White Sox winning the opener, 5-0 and the A's the second game, 5-4.
GIANTS WIN
In the National League, the New York Giants defeated Cincinnati, 3-1, in the major's only day game and climbed to within 5 1/2 games of Brooklyn's pace-setting Dodgers. The St. Louis Cardinals trounced the Dodgers, 6-4, while in other games, Pittsburgh shaded Boston, 3-2, and Chicago belted Philadelphia, 8-3.
Early Wynn allowed the Senators only six hits in besting Bob Porterfield. Wynn blanked Washington after the first inning in hanging up his 11th victory.
Former Yankee Steve Souchock homered in the ninth for Detroit on Bob Kuzava's first pitch to fracture a 1-1 tie and beat his old team, 1-0.
The Browns nudged Rookie Bob Brodowski for only three hits but they bunched two of them along with two walks in the seventh inning to beat the Red Sox, Bobby Young's two-run triple featured the uprising. Home runs by Hoot Evers and Dick Gernert accounted for all of Boston's runs off Tommy Byrne.
Jim Hearn was the whole show in the Giants' triumph over Cincinnati. He limited the Reds to four hits and won his own game with a two-run homer in the fifth.
The Cards snapped a 4-4 tie in the seventh when Relief Pitcher Ed Yuhas doubled home the run. The Red Birds sewed it up with three more in the ninth off loser Johnny Schmitz.

Mathias Holds Decathlon Lead

HELSINKI (AP)—Bob Mathias, the defending champion from Tulare, Calif., increased his lead in the Olympic decathlon competition after seven events Saturday while assorted other athletes continued the business of methodically wrecking Olympic records.
Mathias, who set a world record in the American decathlon tryouts, dominated the two events run off Saturday morning.
After seven events, he had a total of 6,699 points heading the three-man American delegation at the top of the scoring list. Milton Campbell, 18-year-old Plainfield, N. J., schoolboy, held second place with 5,794 points and Floyd Simmons of Los Angeles was third with 5,303.
Ignace Heinrich of France, second in the American decathlon tryouts, dominated the two events run off Saturday morning.

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Barthel Shatters Record

HELSINKI (AP)—Joseph Barthel of Luxembourg broke the Olympic record for the 1,500 meter run—the "metric mile"—and Galina Zybina of Russia shattered the world and Olympic stands for the women's shot put Saturday at the most brilliant Olympic games of all ended the sixth day of track and field competition.
With one more day of competition left on the Red brick dust track of the Olympic stadium, six world records already have been exceeded and 23 Olympic records broken in track and field.
In each of the distance races run so far—the 10,000 meters, the 5,000 meters and 2,000 meter steeplechase and the 1,500 meters—the first six finishers all have been under the previous Olympic records.
SAME TIME
In one of the greatest surprises, almost matching Horace Ashenfelter's record-smashing triumph in the steeplechase Friday, young Bob McMillen of Occidental College in Los Angeles ran second to Barthel, but he was the winner's record time of 3:45.2. It was the best performance ever turned in by an American at this distance.
The field for the day's metric mile probably was the fastest ever assembled, for the six runners who finished out of the money were closely bunched with the leaders. Warren Truistler of LaGrange, Ill., America's second finalist, finished last, in 3:56.
The first six all surpassed the listed Olympic record of 3:47.8 made by Jack Lovelock of New Zealand.
GOLD MEDAL
Galina Zybina threw the shot 50 feet 2.58 inches to win another Olympic gold medal for Russia, which is far ahead of the United States in total point scoring although it has scored comparatively little in track and field. She broke the world record of 49 feet 3.35 inches and the Olympic mark of 45 feet 1.33 inches.
In the only other track final Saturday, Australia's Marjorie Jackson won her second Olympic title but failed to match her world record feat of Friday. She won the 200 meters dash in 23.7 seconds after taking her semi-final heat in 23.4.
