Steelmen Work for Full Production As Labor Troubles Plague U.S.

The steel industry strove Monday toward its goal of full production in a week after settlement last Thursday of a 55-day strike of CIO Steelworkers.

which has idled 9,500 employees of trucking companies.
The 2,400 striking truck drivers demand a 40-hour week, instead of the present 48, and a wage increase of 31 cents hourly to bring the average pay to \$1.90 an hour. They rejected over the week end a management proposal of a 44-hour week this year and a 40-hour week the next year, plus a 20-cent hourly pay raise now and 10 cents more a year hence.

cents an hour boost in lowest paid classifications, and stepped-up increases through higher classifications to a maximum of 25 cents an hour. The average is 16 1/2.
The steel settlement also was displeasing to economic stabilizer Roger L. Putnam. He accused the industry of having held a loaded gun at the government's head to get an "unjustified price increase" of \$5.65 a ton—one of the conditions of settlement.

17 Million Dollars Tagged For School Building Jobs

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government Monday tabbed 17 million more dollars for school construction projects in federally-affected defense areas.
Earlier this month, 67 million dollars was earmarked for this purpose. The new allocations brings the total reserved for school construction to 84 million dollars, still less than half the 185 million dollars appropriated for this purpose by the 82nd Congress.

We have had the gamut of buttons . . . a few I Like Everybody ones, a torrent of I Hate Everyone; small tin replicas of a coonskin hat for guess whom; real handsome portrait ones of Harriman; Hustle with Russell, ones; Gladly with Adlai ones, to mention a few.
On the other hand, there is almost none of the razz-ma-tazz side-show which accompanied the Republican convention. The Hilton hotel lobby, which crawled with humanity during the GOP tenure, looks almost deserted. No organ banging, no shouting, no gorgeous gals handing out propaganda.

The candidates provide free coke dispensers, complete with volunteer airline hostesses to hand you the bottle. All of them provide television sets and chairs.
There is no excuse for anyone buying his own food. Don't know about the men, but the women get excellent coffee, fresh orange juice and horrible doughnuts every morning at their gathering. Lunch is taken care of at the candidates' open cheese and cracker bars and dinner is superfluous after the round of receptions, cocktail parties, etc., which offer the gamut from caviar at the invitational affairs to a choice of fruit or rum punch and crackers at the open receptions.

Senator Russell has set up a lounge complete with a samovar of hot coffee for members of the press only: The place is crowded as there is also a four by four foot television screen and overstuffed chairs.
Elmer, the Democratic mule, actually held a press conference in the basement. Didn't say much.

The seats at the convention hall are half empty.
As I said at the beginning, I need one of those IAK buttons. Someone of the tremendous crusading undercurrent which marked the GOP convention is lacking. The only way I can explain it is that, first, the Democrats are in and used to it, and second, the Democratic propaganda program is based on "Security" which blares forth from banner after banner but fails to carry the impact of a banner marked "Tail" or "Ike."
