

Egypt Wafdists Back Party's 'Strong Man'

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — The head of Egypt's powerful Wafd party voiced jubilant support Monday for the country's new strong man, Maj. Gen. Mohammed Naguib, and hailed his ouster of King Farouk and his promise of a reformed national government.

The sweeping praise for Naguib came from Mustapha El Nahas Pasha, the party head whom Farouk ousted from the premiership after last January's disastrous riots in Cairo and who returned Monday from a European tour.

A high Wafdist source said the party, Egypt's largest and the sweeping victor in the last general elections, would support Naguib and his new premier, Aly Maher Pasha.

Nahas Pasha's high praise for

Naguib and his plans took on particular interest for observers here, since much of the corruption which the new regime has sworn to root out and punish has been charged in the past to members of the earlier Wafdist administration.

The violently nationalist Wafdists, too, were chiefly responsible for Egypt's ordering the British out of the Suez Canal Zone and the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan.

The new cabinet, meanwhile, moved back to Cairo and Naguib sternly warned that he and Maher Pasha would "meet with armed force if necessary any attempt at demonstrations or disorders."

He warned, too, that foreign interference would not be tolerated.

As the cabinet quit the summer capital at Alexandria for Cairo, the ousted monarch sailed toward Italy in the royal yacht Mahroussa.

King Farouk was his six-month-old son, now Egypt's King Fuad II, Farouk's teenage second wife Nariman, and his three daughters by a previous marriage.

One newspaper said the baby king would be returned to Egypt when he is seven years old, the age at which Moslem mothers traditionally lose control of their sons.

The cabinet, meanwhile, temporarily held the royal powers pending creation of a regency council.

The Nile kingdom generally rejoiced at the departure Saturday night of fat, playboy Farouk, whose downfall started when the 51-year-old Gen. Naguib and a coterie of younger officers took over the army last Wednesday and forced the King to install Maher Pasha and a new anti-corruption government.

There were cheers and aerial bombs set off as he appeared in the doorway of the Springfield-bound train to acknowledge the tribute. The train was delayed more than a half hour.

It was a day of acclamations by the governor's old friends and neighbors, both here and in Springfield, the state capital. A second celebration was planned in Springfield for Stevenson.

Stevenson Gets Noisy Welcome

BLOOMINGTON, Ill. (AP) — Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson received a noisy welcome Monday from the citizens of his home town.

Thousands of people jammed the railroad station for a glimpse of the 32-year-old Bloomington man who reluctantly accepted the Democratic presidential nomination last Saturday.

There were cheers and aerial bombs set off as he appeared in the doorway of the Springfield-bound train to acknowledge the tribute. The train was delayed more than a half hour.

It was a day of acclamations by the governor's old friends and neighbors, both here and in Springfield, the state capital. A second celebration was planned in Springfield for Stevenson.

Stevenson To Visit State

PORTLAND (AP) — Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois will campaign in Oregon for the presidency, delegates returning from the Democratic national convention reported.

Howard Morgan, Democratic state chairman, and C. Girard Davidson, an alternate delegate, arrived by plane from Chicago Sunday.

Morgan said he had received personal assurance from Stevenson that he would be in Oregon before the November elections.

Davidson, a former assistant secretary of the Interior, praised the Western plank of the Democratic platform. It calls for more dam construction by the federal government, forest conservation and an expanded grazing program.

Davidson also praised the selection of Sen. John Sparkman of Alabama as the Democratic vice presidential candidate.

"Sparkman played a major role in the adoption of the civil rights plank which was adopted. He was on the Platform Committee, and prevented the balance of the Southern members from rejecting the plank," Davidson said.

Both Davidson and Morgan criticized other members of the delegation.

Davidson said the "loudest shout" in the convention hall "was" by State Sen. Thomas Mahoney of Portland on the motion to make the nomination of Stevenson unanimous.

Morgan criticized Delegate Joe Carson for not making an appearance at the convention. "Apparently he ran just to give his name," Pinky (William L.) Josselin, a delegate to serve without going before the Oregon voters," Morgan said.

Eisenhower Men Study Strategy

DENVER (AP) — Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, ousted after a ten day vacation, held a long conference Monday with his new political chief of staff, Gov. Sherman Adams of New Hampshire.

The Republican presidential nominee and Adams talked over campaign organizational problems. Among others present at the meeting at Eisenhower headquarters at the Brown Palace hotel, were Sen. Frank Carlson of Kansas, and Fred A. Seaton of Nebraska, advisors to the general, and Arthur H. Vandenberg, Jr. his executive assistant.

ORGANIZATION

Eisenhower Press Secretary James C. Hagerly told newsmen the session was devoted to organization of the general's personnel staff and plans for liaison with the Republican National Committee and the National Citizens for Eisenhower Committee.

The Republican nominee returned here Sunday night from the Rocky Mountain cattle ranch near Fraser, Colo., where he went for a rest a few days after the Republican convention.

Sunday the general discussed campaign plans with his vice presidential running mate, Sen. Richard Nixon of California.

Eisenhower and Nixon joined in predicting a Republican victory in November.

Nixon said he was confident "we are going to have the victory for Gen. Eisenhower that the country needs."

Seated on a bench alongside the Senator, Eisenhower interrupted and told his 29-year-old running mate: "You mean victory for my party and not just for me, my boy—and, more important, victory for the country."

Fire Levels Shaker Church

Destruction of Chiloquin's Shaker Church facilities, started last winter by heavy snows, was completed this morning by fire.

Heavy roof snow last winter collapsed the main church building, leaving only a portion of the building's front standing. This morning fire broke out in the debris and destroyed the church's adjacent dining hall, a large frame structure.

The quick-spreading flames ate into the edge of the nearby forest before they were controlled by the Klamath Agency fire fighting crew.

Cause of the fire was undetermined.

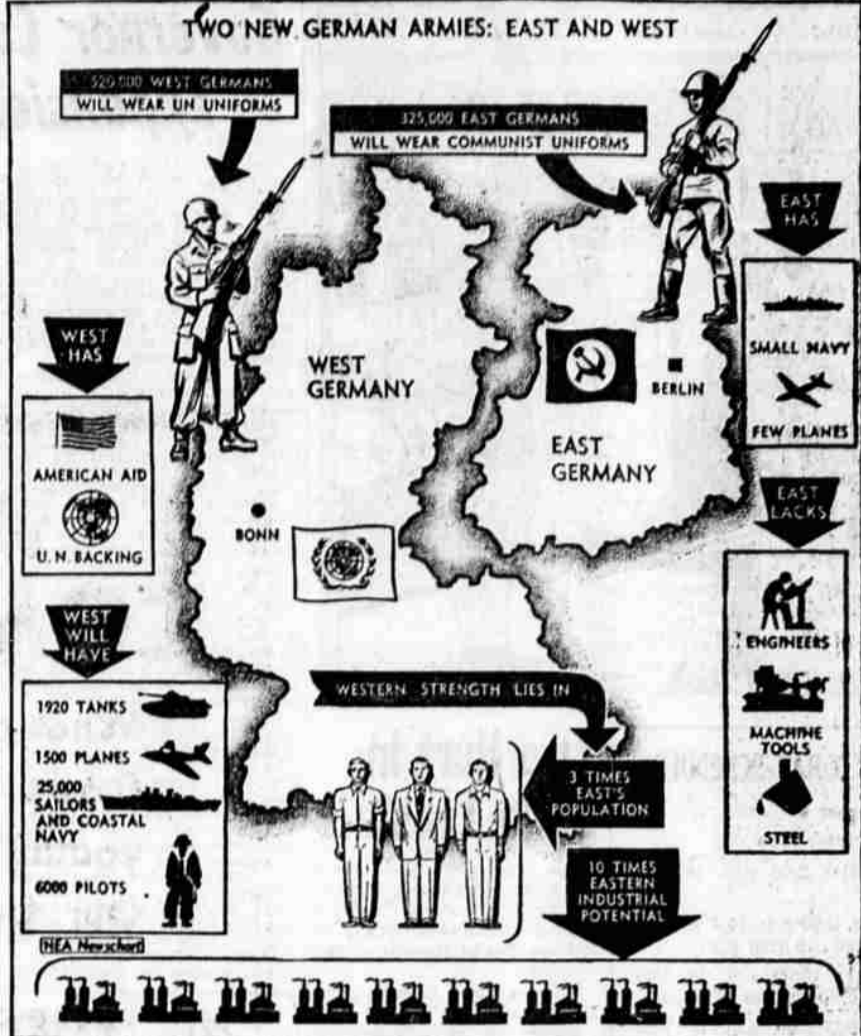

HOW RIVAL GERMAN armies will stack up—When an if—the six-power European Defense Community pact is ratified, the way will be cleared for a West German army, wearing uniforms of the UN's European force. It will make up the largest armed group facing Russia on the East. Opposed to it will be the highly organized "People's Army" of Eastern Germany, led by East German Security Minister Wilhelm Zaisser and taking orders from the Kremlin. How the two armies stack up in their respective potentialities is illustrated on the Newschart above. The West German forces will carry heavy American arms and be organized on the U. S. model. They will be part of the six-nation European force to which France, Italy, Germany, Belgium, Holland and Luxembourg will contribute. The Communist-sponsored East German force, with its individual blue uniform, is trained by Russians and led by former Nazi officers. Members attend classes in Communist doctrine two hours a day. A weak point in its morale and recruiting is the fact that young East Germans have only a grim choice — join the "People's Police" or dig in the uranium mines.

Urban Law Said Legal

PORTLAND (AP) — Circuit Judge James Crawford Monday ruled constitutional Oregon's new urban development law which provides for clearing of "blighted" areas in cities.

The decision makes possible an eight million dollar industrial development of the Vaughn street area of Portland. It is one of three designated as "blighted" by the Portland Housing Authority.

The law provides that housing authorities in cities of more than 70,000 may acquire property in "blighted" areas, and clear and sell it for redevelopment.

Judge Crawford said that the area, including 44 blocks, is only nine per cent residential and has been declining as a residential area since it reached a peak in 1910. More than 85 per cent of the dwellings in the area have been declared substandard.

He said juvenile delinquency in the area is "excessive" and fire calls in one year were 100 per cent greater than the city average.
