

Politicians Return As Convention Work Concludes

The Democratic national ticket—Gov. Adlai Stevenson and Sen. John J. Sparkman—went back to work Tuesday in jobs interrupted last week before the party picked nominees for president and vice president.

The Republican ticket—Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and Sen. Richard M. Nixon—went ahead with plans for the November election campaign. Nominated by the GOP two weeks earlier, they were that much ahead of the Democrats in mapping political strategy.

Whittier, Calif., Monday night and was welcomed by a parade and a reception attended by 5,000 at the Whittier College stadium.

With no state-wide contests, Louisiana Democrats will choose their nominees for eight seats in Congress. Rep. James Morrison has no opposition in the Sixth District.

Arkansas, Democratic Gov. Sid McMath, seeking a third term, is opposed by Atty. Gen. Ike Murray, former Atty. Gen. Jack Holt, Rep. Boyd Tackett and Chancery Judge Francis Cherry.

In Texas, where the Democratic nomination usually means election, Democrats renominated Gov. Allan Shivers and nominated Attorney General Price Daniel for U.S. Senator on the basis of the latest count from Saturday's primary.

X-Ray Drive Enlists Bus

A county school bus has been converted into a mobile X-ray unit for the drive underway now with a 24,000-picture goal slated by the end of September.

The bus, loaned the X-ray drive unit by the County School Supt., Carroll Howe, will set up in Ferris, Malin and some suburban areas around Klamath Falls.

It began working the Malin area today, from 2 to 7 p.m. and was to continue there tomorrow, near the postoffice, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Thursday it will set up in Merrill near the postoffice there and remain through Friday, Thursday's time is 2 to 7 p.m., and Friday 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Meanwhile the second X-ray unit was in Shevlin today, and is to set up at Healy at 10 a.m. tomorrow. Thursday it will set up at Cret Williams Station in Sprague River from 3 to 8 p.m., and Friday's schedule calls for its appearance at Fort Klamath Community Building from 1 to 7 p.m.

So far more than 600 persons have been X-rayed, said County Health Officer Dr. Seth Kerron. He said he felt the tempo would pick up as the X-ray units move into more heavily populated areas. He said an X-ray program recently held in Deschutes county served many Northern Klamath County residents.

American Legion has attracted other notables here, too, many of them Legionnaires. Mayors of numerous Oregon towns and cities are in Klamath Falls—and Klamath's own Mayor Bob Thompson is also a Legionnaire.

Medford's old French-styled locomotive, whistle and all, has been playing havoc with traffic on down-

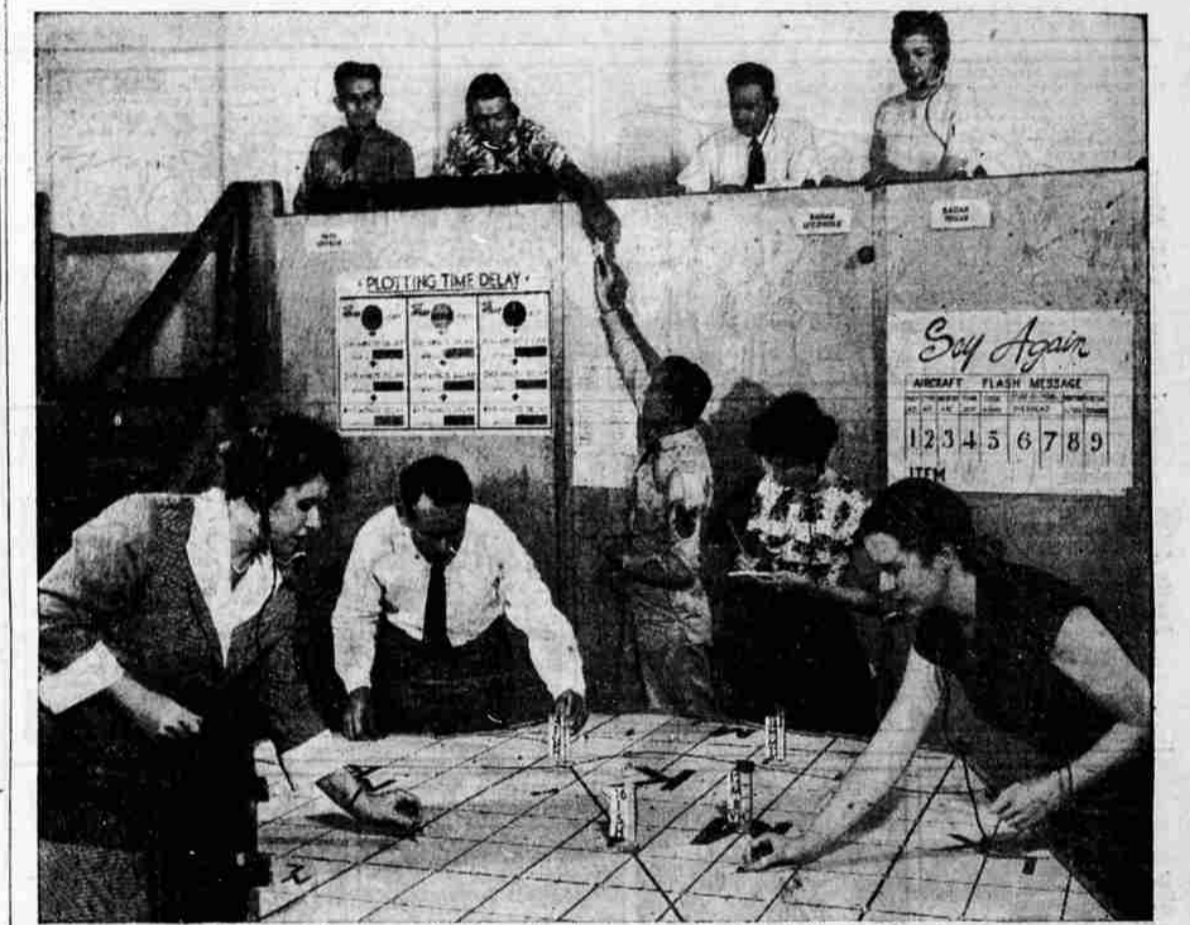
town streets to the utter delight of townspeople and conventioners alike.

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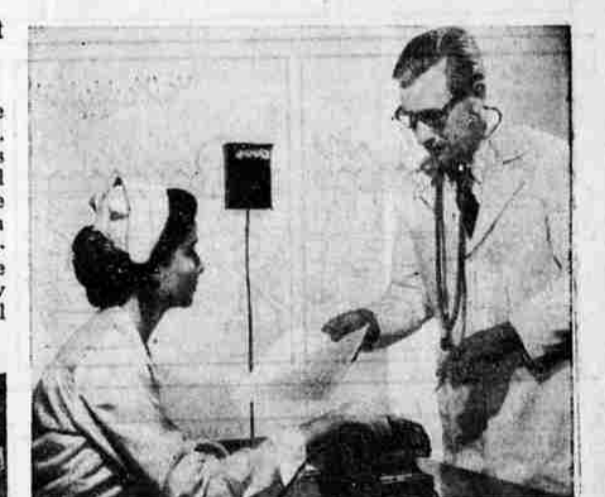


Air Defense Filter Centers like this one keep sharp watch on the flight of all unidentified aircraft.

2. This ingenious master dial is the basic "nerve center" of the "Bell and Lights" warning system. To alert all connected stations, the control official merely dials, as he would a telephone, one of four colors—yellow, blue, red or white—which flashes the degree of the alert. Should normal power supplies fail in an emergency, the system will still work—drawing on the independent power equipment located at telephone offices.

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
