Date, Site, Pay-offs Argued

NEW YORK (AP)—Plans for a million dollar September title match between heavyweight champion Jersey Joe Walcott and Rocky Marciano, the Brockton, Mass., crusher, hinge on three important points:

1. Percentages. Felix Boechchio, Walcott's manager, insists on 45 per cent. Marty Weill, Marciano's manager, wants "more than 15 per cent." Promoter Jim Norris says he can allot only 60 per cent.
2. Date. Weill and Norris prefer Tuesday, Sept. 23. Boechchio likes Sept. 15 or Sept. 16.
3. Site. Weill and Norris want New York's Yankee Stadium. Boechchio wants a place "where I can manage my fighter," possibly Jersey City or Philadelphia.

HEADACHE
The percentage angle may give Norris' International Boxing Club quite a headache. If Marty Weill, whose step father Al Weill is I. B.C. matchmaker, insists on too much more than 15 per cent, they will have quite a hassle.

Marciano, fresh from his sensational two-round knockout of Harry Matthews, planned to remain in New York a few days to await a definite date on the big fight. He'll go to camp in about two weeks.

SURPRISE
The 27-year-old Brockton bullboy expressed surprise that Matthews did not "jab and run." As Rocky put it, "He really wanted to fight."

Matthews left for his Seattle home leaving manager Jack Hurley to collect the paycheck of about \$51,078.87 — the same amount Rocky collected for five minutes work.

Will it be the miracle of the Mound City in 1952 just as it was the miracle of Coogan's Bluff in 1951?

Stanky is keeping discreetly quiet as his sizzling St. Louis Cardinals continue to apply pressure on the Dodgers and Giants in the National League race. But there is no doubt the scrappy little Redbird skipper is thinking if it happened once it can happen again.

Who will forget the '51 pennant race in which the Giants, sparked by Stanky, rose from a 13 1/2 game deficit on Aug. 11 to nose out the Dodgers for the pennant in a play-off?

With that in mind, it would be hazardous to discount the third place Cardinals because they trail the pace-setting Dodgers by eight and a half games with 87 more to go.

They struggled through 13 in-

nings Tuesday night before they finally downed the Braves in Boston, 6-5, to pick up a full game on the Dodgers and Giants.

Murry Dickson gained the honor of becoming the first Pittsburgh pitcher to defeat Brooklyn this season ending a 13-game Dodger winning streak over the Pirates with an eight-hit 7-1 triumph.

Rookie Warren Hacker, with the help of veteran Dutch Leonard, gained his ninth triumph as the Chicago Cubs defeated the Giants, 4-2.

Philadelphia's Phillies continued their blistering pace, sweeping a two-night twin bill from Cincinnati, 6-1 and 4-3.

Mickey Mantle's grand slam the opener.

The St. Louis Browns won their sixth game in seven starts as Ned Garver and Earl Harriet pitched a 7-3 decision over Spec Shea and the Washington Senators.

Philadelphia and Detroit split a doubleheader, the Tigers rallying to win the second game, 10-8, after Harry Byrd had hurled the Athletics to a 5-9 shutout victory in the opener.

Seattle whipped Portland 3-1 in the opener of their eight-game Pacific Coast League baseball series at Portland Tuesday night to knock the Beavers into sixth-place, half a game behind Los Angeles.

It was a scoreless ball game until the seventh when Seattle's Al Lyons homered off Lyman Linde, but it remained for clutch-hitter Rocco Kramlich to single in Artie Wilson and Walt Judnich with the tying and winning runs in the eighth.

The teams clash in a doubleheader Wednesday night with Vern Kindersfater (13-8) opposing Larry Ward (8-6) in the opener and Steve Nagy (11-9) facing Fred Sanford (12-4) in the nightcap.

Los Angeles moved into fifth place, three games behind Seattle, as Portland moved out.

The Angels, home from a disaster-

ous two-week round trip, pinned Oakland down for a 7 to 5 victory.

Hollywood, playing seventh place San Francisco, took a 5 to 1 pasting. The Glacs ran into some floozy pitching by Floyd Bevens and Bill Bradford, and could get only four hits.

BASES LOADED
The Seals put together five singles in the third for three runs and the ball game, driving starter Joe Muir out. Bevens walked the bases full in the ninth and gave way to Bradford with two out.

San Diego, apparently back on the victory trail after two weeks of unsteady, erratic play, beat Sacramento by an 8 to 5 count.
