Air Force Studies

One new step being planned is use of a newly developed telescopic camera which can photograph a 150-degree area of sky on one plate.
Other specialized, highly sensitive cameras also will be used.
The Air Force experts said Tuesday that some of the reports of flying saucers admittedly have stemmed from the firing of rockets, guided missiles and other defense research work — but not in the Washington area. None of this work is being done near the capital, Sanford said.
KADAR SETS
Some of the unidentified objects show up distinctly on radar sets. Early Tuesday, for example, the Civil Aeronautics Administration at Washington National Airport reported strange blips on its radar screen — dots which normally would represent airplanes moving through the sky — for a pre-dawn break period of almost five hours.
Other radar units in the area failed to pick up the objects, however. No visual sightings were reported. An airliner, following radio instructions from the ground radar, flew through one of the objects as seen on the screen without encountering anything. After the plane moved on, the pip reappeared on the radar screen.
It is not unusual for radio to pick up strange things, Sanford said. Rain squalls (pilots sometimes use radar to avoid thunderstorms), birds, water spouts — even surf spray.

GOP Claims Rifts Healed

WASHINGTON (AP)—National Chairman Arthur E. Summerfield claimed Wednesday most of the bruises and bitterness within the Republican party from the Taft-Eisenhower convention battle already have disappeared.
Summerfield, new head of the party in announcing appointment of key campaign officials in the drive to elect Dwight D. Eisenhower as president and Sen. Richard Nixon as vice president.
With an accent on youth and midwesterners, Summerfield made these appointments:
Wayne J. Hood of La Crosse, Wis., 39, a former Taft leader, to be executive director of the national committee.
48 former head of National Eisenhower Roberts of Holton, Kan., former headquarters here, to be director of organization.
Stanley R. Pratt, 38, of Sault Ste Marie, Mich., a radio executive, as Summerfield's personal representative assigned to General Eisenhower's headquarters.

NIXON
Nixon, after a few hours at his home in Whittier, Calif., went to San Francisco Tuesday night for a reception. Wednesday he was to go to Fresno and San Diego for brief visits before taking off for the Ohio Republican convention in Columbus Thursday.
In Tuesday's Democratic primary in Arkansas, Sid McMath, seeking a third term as governor with President Truman's support, led four opponents but was forced into a run-off with Chancery Judge Francis Cherry Aug. 12.
Another Democratic primary in Louisiana saw the renomination, equivalent to election, of four Democratic U. S. representatives—Hebert, Boggs, Brooks and Parnell. Rep. Willis, seeking a third term was engaged in a nip-and-tuck struggle with former State Senator Dudley J. LeBlanc. Rep. Morrison was unopposed for renomination to his seat.

OLCC Makes Sale Probe

Evidence taken is to be presented to the Oregon Liquor Control Commission for administrative action.
