## Grand Opera Portland, Free 'Faust' Sung

In the cool, green outdoor amphitheatre of Washington Park, the City of Portland Park Bureau and the Portland Civic Opera association, August 1 to 24, will hold the Third Annual Washington Park Summer Festival. The host city cordially invites all Oregon people to come and bring their summertime guests for the colorful drama and music events. All are free. Highlight of the festival will be presentation of Gounod's grand opera, "Faust," at 5 p.m. on Saturday, August 9, Sunday, August 10, and Saturday, August 16. Director is Ariel Rubenstein who so successfully produced "Aida" two years ago, and "Carmen" last summer. With "Faust" there will be a 65-piece orchestra and chorus of 100 voices. The tuneful opera will feature local singers: Robert Milam and Walter Richardson as "Faust"; Charles Trumbley and John Misar as "Mephistopheles"; David Johnson as "Valentin"; Robert McCoy as "Wagner"; Irene Horvath and Helen McCartney as "Marguerite"; Barbara Crooks and Marjorie Ross as "Siebel"; Helen Overton and Dorothy French as "Martha"; Arthur Hitchcock is chorus director and Mark Daniels, stage director. The sets were designed by Doris Johnson. The dramatic plot concerns itself with the aged philosopher, "Faust," who bargains with the devil, "Mephistopheles" to sell his soul for eternal youth. Faust falls in love with the lovely Marguerite. Tragedy ensues... but it all makes for some mighty potent drama and beautiful music! Other festival events will be "A Mighty Fortress," new play by Oregon's Jane Erickson, directed by Charles Jaupp, dramatizing Marcus and Narcissa Whitman, pioneer missionaries, August 1 and 2; a Square Dance Jamboree, Monday, August 11; the ballet "Pinocchio," Tuesday and Wednesday, August 12 and 13 and again Friday August 15; the International Folk Dancers, Sunday, August 17; the "Mikado," by the Portland Civic Theater and the Portland Symphonic Choir, Monday and Tuesday, August 18 and 19; summer band concert Thursday, August 14, and Wednesday, August 20. Except "Faust" which will be at 5 p.m. all other events are scheduled for 8 p.m.

## Auxiliary Accomplishes Heavy Program of Work

The 32nd annual State Convention of the American Legion Auxiliary was opened Monday morning at the Mills School Auditorium, with State President, Mrs. W. E. Wilkins presiding.

The most distinguished guest, Past National President, Mrs. Hubert Goode, Portland, was presented and Mrs. Charles Gunn, Portland, Vice Chairman of the National Rehabilitation Committee. Other distinguished guests, to bring greetings from many organizations, included, Representatives from the Daughters of the American Revolution, The Veterans of Foreign Wars, the Women's Relief Corps, and Marie Tatom the Past State president of the Eight and Forty, the Auxiliary's Honor society.

A citation of merit from the American Cancer society was presented to the Department president Mrs. Wilkins, who according to the report has had a very busy year, this being the largest convention ever held and with the largest membership ever attained. Mrs. Wilkins reported that there were now 3,470 members enrolled in the Oregon department, which included 1,615 junior members.

Mrs. Wilkins paid high praise to the chairmen of the various committees for outstanding work, namely the Americanism, under the direction of Mrs. Forrest Erickson of Estacada. A total of 3,147 individual essays were entered in the competition, with 89 essays reaching state competition. One hundred new flags have been presented throughout the state of Oregon and 3,250 flag codes distributed to schools and youth groups.

**HELP GIVEN**  
Mrs. Wilkins paid high commendations on the work this year of the Child Welfare program, under the direction of Mrs. Harold Leach, Bonaville, the department chairman. Over 3,000 individual cases have been assisted with the expenditure of many thousands of dollars, derived from the portion to the Poppy Sale proceeds. "A square deal for every child" is still the aim of both the Legion and Auxiliary.

Two hundred and nineteen veterans made poppies and were paid \$8413. A total of 418,830 poppies were made by the veterans in the Oregon Hospitals. The vast Rehabilitation program of the Auxiliary is ever on the increase, and the need is greater than ever for more funds each year as the number of these hospital cases mount. The increase in the poppies ordered by the many units was 12,000 more than last year. It is from the proceeds derived from the sale of poppies that the Auxiliary is able to carry on the work of rehabilitation and Child Welfare.

The Christmas Gift Shop was the largest ever held. Packages were mailed to nearly all states in the Union and Canada, Scotland, England and Italy. Value of these gifts received, which are given so that patients may send home a gift at the Christmas time exceeded \$3,300.

**VOLUNTEER HELP**  
Mrs. Wilkins also reported that there had been 215 volunteer hospital workers, with a total of 12,323 hours of service given in the hospitals. Ten Auxiliary members have received 1,000 hour certificates for that amount of time spent working in the hospital this past year. Five orientation and indoctrination schools were held in the several hospitals.

The Girls State program, under the chairmanship of Mrs. LaVern

Campbell, Portland, had one of the largest sessions this year ever held with 216 girls in their Junior years at High School attending. Delegates learned the workings of city, county and state government. Two girls are now on their way to Washington, D. C. for the session of Girls Nation where they will learn of government on the national level. The girls attending from Oregon are Fran Cooper, Grants Pass, and Carolyn Kullander, Portland.

Mrs. Wilkins commended the Auxiliary for the outstanding work each member had accomplished and thanked all for their cooperation in making this year a success.
