Eisenhower-Nixon Ticket Gets Support of Most Newspapers

ATLANTA (AP) — Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower will have the editorial support of more newspapers than ever before backed a Republican presidential nominee in the traditionally Democratic south.

An Associated Press survey of nearly 100 papers in 11 Southern states shows Friday that 41 have endorsed the general or will do so and past performance indicates several in the "undecided" list will go to him.

Paradoxically, however, this does not mean that editors of the area are much more opposed to the 1952 Democratic candidate, Adlai Stevenson, than they were to President Truman when he ran in 1948.

Four years ago the anti-New Deal-Fair Deal sentiment was divided between Thomas Dewey, the GOP nominee, and Strom Thurmond, choice of the States' Righters and these two men drew more editorial page endorsements than Truman. That year, 24 of the papers surveyed were for Dewey, 22 for Thurmond.

At this early stage in the campaign, only 22 papers have come out for Stevenson and Sen. John Sparkman, the Democrats' vice

Helicopters Span Atlantic

PRESTWICK, Scotland (AP) — Two U.S. Army Sikorsky's, the first helicopters to fly the Atlantic, arrived here Thursday after 3,300 mile "hop-along" flight from Westover, Mass.

The two flying windmills had taken off from Keflavik, Iceland, on the last and longest hop of their Atlantic flight.

The experimental flight was launched by the Military Transport Service to test the feasibility of delivering helicopters to Europe by air.

The planes started from Westover Air Force Base two weeks ago on a six-stop, 4,000 mile flight to Wiesbaden, Germany.

The big ships came hovering down here to make aviation history and break the official helicopter distance record by more than 200 miles.

Manning the ships were Capt. Vincen H. McGovern, 29, of Springfield, N. J.; Capt. Harry C. Jeffers, 27, of Newark, N. J.; 1st Lt. Harold W. Moore, 26, of Cincinnati, O.; and Capt. George O. Hambrick, 32, of Sayre, Okla.

The idea of proving the reliability of helicopters on such a flight was McGovern's.

Early Basin Resident Dies

According to word just reaching here, Malcolm Peterson Mickler Sr., died in Tampa, Florida, on July 25, at the age of 75. He will be remembered by earlier residents of the Basin as a former owner of the Crystal Springs ranch, now owned by Dr. Paul Sharp. He lived here for several years, beginning about 1910. He has visited here several times since.

Mr. Mickler was a member of an early Florida family, and was both a lumberman and a stockman. He made his first \$10,000 at the age of 19 in the lumber business and used the money to go into the then new cattle industry in the Everglades country of Florida. He was one of the earliest cross-breeders of Brahmas with native cattle to develop a breed that could stand the peculiar climate of that part of Florida.

He came to the Basin from Florida, and returned there after disposing of his interests here.

Helicopters Save Troops

TOKYO (AP) — Helicopters of the U.S. Air Force Third Air Rescue Squadron Wednesday evacuated 668 persons marooned in two areas by the rampaging Han River in Korea.

Far East Air Forces said seven helicopters rescued 668 persons, mostly Air Force personnel, from an airbase in 116 sorties. Pilot skirted along the river and through a canyon to lift the U.N. personnel to safety.

Sarcastic Prisoner Gets Term In County Lockup

Because of a bitter courtroom scene, a 26-year-old Salem resident and ex-convict will spend this month in the Klamath County jail rather than in the state penitentiary.

He is Omar William Fromme, who only last Monday was released from San Quentin on parole. He was brought here to face a larceny (car theft) charge.

Fromme pleaded guilty in Circuit Court Tuesday to the indictment, which accuses him of having stolen a car here June 23, 1950, and yesterday afternoon Judge David R. Vandenberg sentenced him to five years in prison.

As he turned away from the bench, the slender prisoner muttered something like "What a chump!", in a voice hardly audible.

Judge Vandenberg called to him, asking what he had said.

Fromme replied sarcastically: "I'll cop out to you people again, expecting to get a break."

The term "cop out" is jailhouse slang for pleading guilty to a criminal charge without fighting it.

At that, Judge Vandenberg ordered the five-year sentence set aside and when Fromme kept talking ordered Deputy Sheriff Dal Reed to take him back to jail until the court reconvenes in September. The judge reminded Fromme that larceny can be punished by a sentence up to 10 years instead of five.

The court will be in recess this month for vacation, so Fromme won't be brought back before Sept. 1.

On the way downstairs to the jail, Fromme twice tried to wriggle out of the deputy's grasp, but Reed kept a firm grasp on the man's arm and steered him into the lockup.

Fromme admitted he stole the car and drove it to Redding where he committed an armed robbery. He was caught and sentenced to five years in San Quentin. He was paroled from that sentence to be brought here to face the car theft count.

By his courtroom remarks he apparently seemed to think he was in pleading guilty to the larceny charge, expecting a light sentence.

Also in Circuit Court yesterday afternoon were two young men who were placed on probation for criminal offenses earlier this year and were re-arrested for probation violations.

Hoyt Junior Kesterson, 23, was placed on three-year probation April 17 after pleading guilty to burglary, and broke a court order against drinking by being lodged in the City Jail this week for being unwell.

Judge Vandenberg also ordered him to be held in the county lockup until September for another court appearance.

Dallas LaVerne Cochran, 21, was placed on probation for five years May 4 for forgery, and the district attorney's office recommended that his probationary sentence be revoked because he failed to make reports to that office and failed to pay off the \$40 bad check.

The judge denied the revocation motion and continued Cochran on probation, ordering him to have the check paid off by Aug. 8.

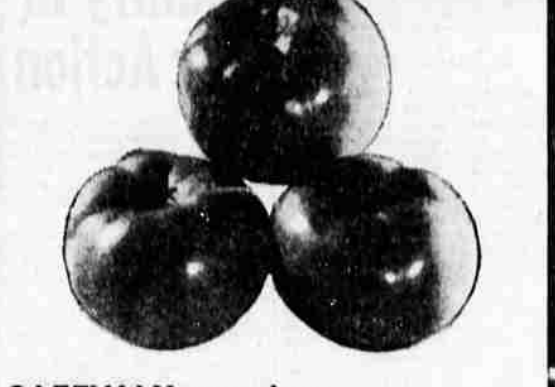
