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AEC Issues NW Report

WASHINGTON (AP)—An Atomic Energy Commission report issued Thursday contained several items of interest in the Pacific Northwest.

1. An AEC committee is still studying the question whether the Wahluke slope near the commission's big plutonium production plant at Hanford, Wash., will be retained under government control or released—for agricultural purposes.

The AEC says that one consideration has been the additional potential hazard that will result from the construction of new production facilities at Hanford under the recently-authorized expansion program.

2. A new processing plant to recover uranium from fuel components of reactors is nearing completion at the AEC's national reactor testing station, Arco, Idaho. Its estimated cost is \$4 million.

3. An AEC man told a reporter the commission is now appraising a report of uranium possibilities in the Portland, Ore., area.
