Shasta School Gets Principal

BLM Records Neat Profit

PORTLAND UP — The Northwest region of the Bureau of Land Management took in \$3.20 for every dollar it spent in the last fiscal year, Administrator Roscoe E. Bell said Saturday.

Expenses in administering some 30 million acres in Idaho, Washington and Oregon totaled \$2,976,364, he said, and revenues were \$9,801,800.

The re-vested Oregon and California railroad grant lands of Western Oregon produced the most money, through timber sales.

All told, timber sales in the three states brought in \$2,293,213 with well over a million dollars to be added to that in this year's collections on last year's sales.

Some of the O & C lands are in controversy — whether under BLM or forest service jurisdiction — and the \$1,564,113 from timber sale on them has been added to five million dollars already in a fund to be paid out when final decision is made on how big a share the counties of Western Oregon get and how much the government keeps.

Public domain land in Idaho produced \$257,854 in timber products sales.

Grazing brought in \$339,294 and minerals \$139,673 in the three states.

Among expenses, Bell listed \$700,000 for removing sagebrush, and sowing creosote whistlers on 64,000 acres of Idaho and Oregon; \$317,000 for fire protection; \$80,000 for reforestation; \$44,000 for blaster rust control; and large sums for range reservoirs, fences, roads and trails and other activities.

Former GP Mayor Dies

GRANTS PASS UP — Joe Alexander Wharton, 79, a former mayor of Grants Pass, died at his home here Sunday.

He was a city councilman and a member of the water commission for a number of years before serving six years as mayor beginning in 1941. He also operated a sporting goods store here for 45 years.

The widow survives.

Alta Fescue Support Down

PORTLAND UP — Federal price supports for Oregon alta fescue seed are far below those of last year.

Arnold N. Bodiker, chairman of the State Production and Marketing Committee of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, said Saturday the support price this year would be 27 cents a pound for certified seed and 20 cents for uncertified seed.

The prices are two cents more than the present market prices but below last year's record high of 60 cents and more.

Death Claims Alaska Newsman

SEATTLE UP — Earle W. Knight 64, publisher of the Alaska Weekly for the past 22 years, died Sunday at his home here. Death was attributed to a heart attack.

Knight was born in Ann Arbor, Mich., and came to Washington State in 1904. He is survived by his wife, two daughters, a son, two brothers and a sister.

Funeral arrangements have not been announced.

Reds Claim Sabotage in 3rd China Harvest

REDS CLAIM 42 2 col
 HONG KONG (AP) — The third harvest under Communism has come to South Central China and the Reds still complain of sabotage by "bandits, special agents, lawbreaking landlords and other evil elements."

The Hankow Communist newspaper, Chang Chiang Daily, tells of the trouble, which is the same as those of last year and the year before.

In one country in Hunan Province there were "220 cases of landlord sabotage," the paper said.

In other areas of the province landlords who lost their land in the redistribution process "recaptured their water mills and took back clothing that had been given to the peasants." Other landlords "recaptured" their acres, houses, livestock and farm tools.

Elsewhere, the paper said, landlords "are committing arson, poisoning wells, damaging reservoirs and dikes."

Power lines have been cut, railroads torn up, bridges burned and woodlots set afire, the newspaper added.

The militia hasn't put down the uprisings because it has been busy supervising harvests, the paper said, indicating that the harvesters still need watching. It accused

Guard Freed Of Assault

SALEM UP — Raymond R. Howell, a prison guard charged with attacking a prisoner, was exonerated and re-instated after a hearing here Saturday.

Howell, formerly a professional boxer, was accused of knocking out Jesse Dall Lawson, 32, during a scuffle in the prison yard last Wednesday.

Lawson, intoxicated on pruno—a fermented drink made by the prisoners—was creating a disturbance in the yard. Howell said he struck Lawson in self defense in attempting to subdue the prisoner.

Deputy Warden Lawrence O'Brien in re-instating Howell, said he thought "Howell's judgement was poor but I do not feel brutality was involved."
