Brooks Wins City Net Title

Earl Brooks owns the city tennis crown today—but the sportsmanship title goes to his final foe, Dr. Raymond Tice.

The books will show Brooks whipping the medico in yesterday's City Tennis Tournament finals at Moore Park by a 6-1, 6-3, 7-6, 7-5 score.

Brooks reached the finals bracket Saturday with a 6-3, 6-4 win over Ronnie Lowell while Tice was whipping Fred Klunk in straight sets, 6-1, 6-2, 6-4.

Brooks added the doubles title when he teamed with Lowell to whip Tice and Bruce Dingler, 6-4, 6-1, 6-4.

But Dingler picked up both the junior men's crown and the men's consolation prize.

The ex-KUHS net star breezed through Vern Keller in the junior finals, 6-3, 6-1. He was pushed somewhat more in the consolation finals against Bud Case, finally winning out, 6-1, 6-2, 6-4.

The women's champion is Ni Patterson.

Fresh after winning her semi-finals match to Clover North by default, Ni beat Jerrie Shoupe in the finals, 6-1, 7-5.

Jerry reached the championship bracket with a 6-4, 6-3 win over Vel Olson.

Jr Taylor successfully defended her junior women's title Friday.

The week-long tournament was sponsored for the second straight year by the Moose Lodge. A banquet is planned soon to award the trophies.

Americans Cop Olympic Team Title

U.S. Wins 5 Crowns In Boxing

HELSINKI (AP)—The 1952 Olympic Games became history Monday and the historians are going to need a whole new book to take care of this gigantic sports carnival.

The games which ended in the Finnish twilight Sunday evening were bigger and better in every way than any of those of the previous 14 modern Olympics.

Forty-nine of the 70 competing countries broke into the unofficial scoring column which recorded the first six places.

The totals varied from 614 for the United States down to 10 made by Singapore for a sixth in featherweight weight lifting.

SECOND

...preicated an extremely well balanced team and scored 203 1/2 points, second to the United States.

The Russians took the lead on the first day with their expected 5-0-0 swim in the women's clinics, were overhauled briefly by the United States during the second and third days of track and field. At the end of the day they led by 64 1/2 points.

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Russians Claim Victory

HELSINKI (AP)—Russia claimed overall victory in the Olympic Games Monday with 494 points against 490.25 for the United States.

Apparently the Russians decided a first place was worth only seven points instead of the 10 points awarded by the standard scoring method used on all Olympic Games since 1920.

A statement issued by N. Romanov, leader of the Soviet Olympic team said the Russian score would have been better if the judging had been more "objective."

Under the standard scoring method, the United States was this year's Olympic team victor with 614 points against 663 1/2 for Russia.

SCORING

This is based on 10, 5, 4, 3, 2, and 1 point awards for the first six placements in all events for which gold medals were awarded.

The Russian statement made no explanation of how the Soviets got their point total, but papers in Moscow said this point system giving seven points for first place instead of ten. Scoring for the other teams was the same as the standard system.

Dispatches from Moscow said this point system was used in the British Olympic Association's report on the 1948 games published in World Sports, The British Group magazine.

There is no official team winner in the games.

TROPHIES

All team tabulations are unofficial and frowned on by Olympic officials. Sunday the Helsinki office of Tass, the official Russians news agency, said no team tabulations were being kept.

The first place gold medals, the United States far outstripped Russia 41 to 23. In track and field events, the central sport of the games, the U. S. won the most first places it has ever taken under the modern program—14 in all of the 24 events.

Most of Russia's scoring came in men's and women's gymnastics, free style and Greco-Roman wrestling, weight lifting and women's track and field competitions.

WIN TWO

Meanwhile, the Brooklyn Dodgers languished further ahead of the New York Giants by sweeping a doubleheader from Chicago, 3-2 and 9-1, while the National League champions dropped a pair to last place Pittsburgh, 7-0 and 10-8.

Cincinnati and Boston divided a regular game, the Braves winning the opener, 7-4, behind Warren Spahn, and the Reds the nightcap, 4-0, on Bubba Church's six-nitter.

The Yanks, with an assist from the Athletics, moved three games ahead of Cleveland in the American League chase. The Yanks trounced St. Louis, 6-1 and 4-2. Philadelphia won the second game, 9-2, after losing the first, 4-1.

ALL BACK

The Red Sox fell four games behind the Senators 5 1/2. Art Houtenauer of Detroit shut out the Red Sox, 6-0, while Washington's Con Marrero and Chicago's Billy Pierce, battled to an eight-inning 6-0 tie in the first game of a doubleheader. The game was called on account of rain in the ninth and the second game was postponed.

Hot Ports Host To Oakland

The Seattle Rainiers headed for Sacramento and a baseball series with the Pacific Coast League tail-enders Monday, happy to see the last of Portland's fast-rising Beavers.

The Rainiers were in fourth place and aspiring for rapid advancement when they opened against the Beavers at Portland last week. The series ended Sunday with Portland in the berth formerly held by the Rainiers who slipped to sixth place half a game behind Los Angeles.

TWO OF EIGHT

Seattle won only two of the eight games, including Sunday's 10-6 victory in the opener of the twin bill. Portland came back to take the second game 8-4.

Vern Kindfather pitched his 14th victory in the opener. Larry Ward was the winner in the nightcap. While Seattle opens a stand at Sacramento Tuesday, Portland will be facing some of its toughest competition of the year as host to Oakland's Oaks who are in second place but only one percentage point ahead of the Hollywood Stars.

DIVIDE

Oakland split a doubleheader with Los Angeles Sunday, taking the opener 4-3 but dropping the afterpiece 8-4.

Hollywood walloped San Francisco 14-5, then stumbled and the Seals claimed the finale 4-3.

San Diego moved up to 2 1/2 games behind Hollywood by shelling Sacramento twice, 2-1 and 6-1.
