New Social Security To Start In October

About 2000 people in the Klamath Falls area will receive higher social security payments beginning early in October as a result of the social security amendments which President Truman signed into law July 16, 1952.

J. D. Gayley, acting manager of the Klamath Falls social security office, emphasized that no one is to apply for the increased payments. "The Social Security Administration is already changing the amounts," he pointed out. "We expect to get them changed in time to have them in the mail Oct. 3, the regular delivery date, but if in a few cases we don't meet that schedule we'll send the regular check and make up the difference in a later check."

Gayley noted that though nearly every family receiving payments receives an increase, the additional amount would not always be divided among all the members of the family receiving monthly checks. In some cases the entire increase will go to the retired worker.

"Under terms of the law, most families will get an increase of about 45; some will get less, some will get more. A few benefits now being paid, and most of those payable in the future, will be based on earnings after 1950 instead of after 1935. The amended law provides a new formula for determining the amount of the payments in these cases. Under it, a retired worker's

Medford Man Makes Find

PRINCE ALBERT, Sask. (AP) — Two United States fish and wildlife workers Monday reported discovery of the summer breeding grounds of the almost-extinct whooping crane, a mystery that has baffled ornithologists for more than half a century.

"They spotted two adult cranes in the marshes north of Great Slave Lake, one on July 11, one the next day.

The two scientists are Robert Henry Smith of Medford, Ore., and Everett L. Sutton of Aberdeen, S.D.

The significance of the discovery, Smith said, can be gauged by the fact that only a few specimens of this four-foot crane remain on the North American continent.

About 30 spend their winters on the Texas coast, 3,000 miles from where the birds breed.

Morse Remains Critical But Still Supports Ike
WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Wayne Morse (R-Ore.), who has been critical of the platform adopted at last month's Republican convention, said in a statement Monday that he will give his full support to the party's presidential nominee, Dwight D. Eisenhower.

But he added that "I shall never hesitate to exercise my honest independence of judgment on any issue with which I disagree with Eisenhower or any other political leader, because one such frankness to the independent voters is in the public interest."

Morse, during the convention, criticized as not liberal enough the Republican plank on civil rights, foreign policy and several other issues.

Morse said in his statement: "I was the first Republican in the Senate to urge publicly the nomination of Eisenhower as a Republican candidate and I am proud to take my place in the ranks of his political crusade."

"It is undoubtedly true that my greatest help to Eisenhower can be among the independent voters and groups of the country and I shall be glad to present to those groups my reasons why I think change of administration by the election of Eisenhower is in the best interest of the country."

Baruch Won't Name Choice
NEW YORK (AP) — Financier Bernard Baruch wants to see which presidential candidate "has the greater wisdom and fortitude to beat inflation" before he decides whom to back.

But the adviser to President in two World Wars adds that he has no intention of supporting either candidate.

"Words alone won't do it," Baruch says. "It will take fortitude."

Baruch spoke with newsmen Monday upon his arrival here aboard the liner Queen Elizabeth. He returned from a two-month visit to Europe.

Long an advocate of tight money control, Baruch said inflation, if not beaten, "will destroy any economic or foreign policy we make."

Four Killed In Plane Crackup
MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Four persons, including two teen-age boys, were killed Monday night when a C-47 twin-engine airplane died 200 feet to earth at the Miami International Airport.

All aboard were killed. They were the pilot, Capt. Robert E. Smith, 29; Miami's John Norman Goodman, 26, co-pilot, formerly of Vietnam; and two passengers, 15, and his brother, Glenn, 13, of Orlando.

Smith and Goodman are pilots for Resort Air Lines, Inc., of Miami. The boys were the sons of another pilot, Lt. Lines pilot, Capt. Dixie Walker.

Goodman's brother, Benny Goodman, is personnel director for the charter airline.

The names of names at first caught an erroneous report that Goodman was the brother of the orchestra leader Benny Goodman.

The plane was on its way to the president of Resort Airlines.

It was being flown here after overhaul at Burbank, Calif.

The boys boarded the plane at "authorized passengers," said William R. Boyd, business manager for the airline.

Adlai Denies ADA Charge
SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP) — Gov. Adlai Stevenson sharply denied Monday that he was a "captive" presidential candidate of the liberal American for Democratic Action (ADA).

The Democratic presidential nominee told a news conference: "I have been my own master so far and I will continue to be."

A reporter told Stevenson there had reports he had been "taken over" by the ADA group.

"I will respond in two syllables—'none,'" he retorted.

The question of ADA's influence in the Stevenson camp arose after the governor named Wilton Wyatt of Louisville, Ky.—former head of the ADA—as his personal campaign manager.

Stevenson also said he had asked historian Arthur M. Schlesinger of Harvard to help him in his campaign—and that Schlesinger had agreed. The professor also is a member of the ADA.

In his second news conference since receiving the Democratic nomination, Stevenson made these points:

1. Letters and telegrams since his nomination have convinced him the people want "refreshing" of the federal government, and not a sharp alteration of the policies which have meant steadily and prosperously for the past two decades.
2. He has reached no conclusion on whether the states or the federal government should control the right-offshore (tidelands) oil deposits. He has asked Texas Gov. Allan Shivers to come to Springfield and discuss the matter with him.
3. He will not "adjust my convictions" to make any sectional appeal for votes in the coming campaign — and he thinks the Democratic civil rights plank which some Southerners don't like "is a good one."

Gas Explosion Causes Crash
FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP) — An Air Force investigating team said Tuesday a jacking gasoline, ignited by a spark, caused the explosion and fire which destroyed a B-36 bomber and injured 13 men.

The big battle plane was being readied for a takeoff and local flight Monday when it exploded during a thunderstorm. At first it was believed lightning struck the big plane.

Two blasts ripped through the plane and officers said it was a complete loss.

Thirteen men were taken from the blast scene to the base hospital, but only seven were hospitalized.

The B-36, which carries 44 of America's atom bomb carrier, costs about \$3,500,000.
