NEW YORK (AP)—More than 1,000 were called out, just 175 lucky ones were chosen Wednesday to make the trek to Seattle for the National Amateur Golf championship on Aug. 18-23.

And if there is going to be a dark horse in the field of 200 at tee-off time—there were 25 exemptions—he will be 35-year-old Charles Makalwa, the champion of Hawaii, who showed them all how it was done by firing an eight-under-par 68-66-134 at the Wai-lae Country Club in Honolulu Tuesday.

So the members of the America's Cup teams of the United States, Canada and Mexico, all of whom were exempt from qualifying, will have something to look forward to when they meet Makalwa.

The United States team includes such worthies as defending champion Billy Maxwell, British amateur champion Harvie Ward and former British titleholder, Frank Strazman.

Until Makalwa posted his score, it looked as though Billy Joe Patton of Morganton, N.C., the runner-up to the North and South championship last year, would head the class.

Playing on his home town course, he posted a 70-65-135. Still, it was No. 1 within the continental borders of the United States.
