Canada On Top Side In Ducat Trade

TORONTO (AP)—Canada's dollar, the only money in world markets higher than United States currency, has created a few problems—and not only for visitors from the United States.

Canadians, who for years have watched Americans turn up their noses at good Canadian currency, have greeted the reversal in their dollar fortunes with goodwill, some head-scratching—and occasional chuckles.

The dollar was up 3-32 of a cent at a premium of 3 3/4 per cent in terms of U.S. funds Friday at New York.

It's those fractions that cause Canucks to scratch their heads. Those who charge at the current discount rate—and a Canadian Press survey shows that most businesses now are doing so—find the figuring a bit involved. Most set around it by charging from 95 to 97 cents for the U. S. dollar.

Here and there the sign "American money accepted at par" tickles the Canadian fancy. It wasn't long ago that the situation was reversed.

The effect of the previous situation still lingers. Recently a U.S. visitor in Yarmouth, N. S., offered a storekeeper a \$20 bill and was told there'd be a small amount of exchange.

"Oh, that's all right," the American woman replied gaily. "You keep it."

The amused man exchanged the bill at par and said he "felt good about it all day." The visitor owed the merchant about 60 cents.

Anomaly of the present situation is that border cities in the United States are still discounting the higher Canadian dollar.

Among visitors from the U. S. there's been a friendly reaction generally. The comment: "We've had it our way long enough," is typical.

A few sales-minded firms in Winnipeg have grabbed the chance to outdo competition by advertising acceptance of U.S. funds at par. An Edmonton firm has simplified matters by keeping separate change stocks of American and Canadian currency.

OCE President To LA College

ASHLAND (AP)—Dr. Roderick G. Langston, president of Eastern Oregon College of Education, has resigned to accept a teaching position at Los Angeles State College, Chancellor Charles D. Byrne announced Tuesday.

Dr. Langston, 37, has been president of the La Grande college since June, 1950.

Before that he was an assistant professor at the University of Oregon. He was a teaching assistant at Sanford, where he earned his doctorate, before coming to Oregon.
