NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market had a slight buoyancy about it Wednesday with the railroads assuming the lead. The action was spotty and lacked widespread support. A handful of strong issues bolstered the list. Gains and losses spread out over a range of between 1 and 2 points higher to less than a point lower. Volume came to an estimated 1,100,000 shares.
