

# Underseas Explorer Turns To Caves

OLORON, France (AP) — Belgian Physicist Max Cosyns, who once plunged under the sea in a bathysphere with Professor Auguste Piccard, started an expedition under the earth Wednesday.

With other speleologists (cave explorers) he will live in darkness for the next two weeks while he tries to beat world records by reaching the depth of more than 1,000 yards in the great black cave which descends under the Pyrenees near the Spanish frontier at Pierre Saint-Martin.

Cosyns and his party made a vertical descent of 832 meters, beating the former world record, last year. After that they descended 566 meters by a sloping declivity to a point where they found a

subterranean river flowing toward the north. (A meter is 3.28 feet).

This time the explorers hope to trace the passage of the river and reach even greater depths.

Base camp for the expedition is already installed within a hundred yards of the opening leading to the caves. It contains food supplies, ladders, ropes, pneumatic boats and water-proof suits.

Cosyns and his French companions intend to build a second camp at a depth of 565 meters. They will make the descent to this point with the aid of electric winding gear.

This machine, designed by the Belgian himself, is expected to enable the drop to be made in only 20 minutes as compared with two hours needed last year.

The explorers hope to trace the course of the underground river by coloring its water and then watching for it in other caves of the chain which winds under the earth. They also intend to make a study of the radio-activity of the subter-

anean rocks and search for any live things in the depths. Last year they found a new species of cockroach — transparent, almost white and without eyes. All the insects found at such great depths are white and blind.

## Youth Admits Weird Killing

BELLINGHAM, Wash. (AP) — Sheriff's officers said a 16-year-old boy admitted in a signed statement Tuesday that he killed his father after brooding over the latter's abusive language to him.

The boy is Paul Garne. The father, Emil Garne, 46, was shot through the head with a rifle in bed early Tuesday in the family home on the Mt. Baker Highway.

Deputy Sheriff Charles Gantrell said the son said he and his father "haven't got along for a long time."

The boy was being held without charge.

His statement released by sheriff's officers described a final abusive incident as he and his father were on a fence-fixing chore Monday night.

"He began swearing at me about tools as he couldn't find them," the statement said. "I showed them to him. Then he said I was dumb and all sorts of swear words. I made up my mind then I would kill him."

"I have thought about it before at different times. We haven't got along for a long time."

"About 6 a.m. in the morning my mother was out at the barn getting the cows in to milk. My father was in bed. I got up and got the 30-30 rifle which was in my bedroom; went to his bedroom; took aim at his head and fired. I knew I had killed him."

"I then went outdoors and told my mother. Then I went and told my uncle."

The uncle called the sheriff's office.

## Pope Declares Social Aim

CASTEL GANDOLFO (AP) — Pope Pius XII said Wednesday the aim of the Roman Catholic church in the labor problem is to overcome and compose social differences.

For the church, he emphasized, the labor question is not "a class struggle."

The pontiff spoke during an audience granted to Italian priests serving as ships' chaplains and missionaries among Italian emigrants in Europe.

Emphasizing several questions as a major problem of priests in their work, the Pope charged them to tell "your faithful that the church has always had and always will have maternal concern for the workers."

In the countries where the missionaries are stationed, the Pontiff continued, the labor question long ago passed "its first stage."

"What 60 or 70 years ago was the goal of the worker has now become his natural right and safe possession and not without the faithful cooperation of the church."

## Canada Credit Party Wins

EDMONTON, Alta. (AP) — The Social Credit Party, which advocates social credit monetary theories—was swept back into power for its fifth consecutive term in Alberta's provincial elections, Tuesday.

It was a landslide victory for Premier E. C. Manning, at 43 the youngest governing leader in Canada.

With a total of 61 seats the standing of the parties was: Social Credit 41; Liberals 1; Cooperative Commonwealth Foundation (CCF) 1; Independent Social Credit 1; doubtful 17.

Manning thus retained the commanding position he held in the previous government which administers this province, rich in oil and natural gas.

His policy of permitting limited export of natural gas to other provinces and the United States won public endorsement.

The opposition had opposed expert at this time claiming that reserves were insufficient for Alberta's own needs.

Both Liberal Leader J. Harper Prowse and CCF Leader Elmer E. Roper were re-elected. The Progressive-Conservatives failed to win a single seat.
