Rex Layne Whips Ezz

Charles Camp In Uproar

OGDEN, Utah (AP) — Husky, young Rex Layne, who won the world's heavyweight championship by knocking out Charles Ezzard, camped in a ten-round decision which threw the Charles camp into an uproar.

Jack Dempsey, the former world's heavyweight champion, was the referee and sole judge, held Layne's hand up in the victory sign as thunderous applause deluged Ogden Stadium.

Immediately afterward, Charles' co-manager, Joe Mintz, rushed into the ring, berated Dempsey that "this is the loudest decision I've ever seen."

Later, Dempsey told a reporter that "I called them just like I saw them. I'm sorry that Mintz or anyone else didn't like the decision. I'm sorry."

Layne weighed 195 and Charles 190 for the outdoor fight which promoter Ken Mayne said drew more than 25,000 fans. Mayne said he would not have an accurate count until later but estimated the gate would top \$150,000.

The Broncos tamed Salem's Senators with three unearned runs in the eighth and a brace in the ninth. The win boosted the Broncos into a fourth-place tie with the Senators. Two walks, two errors and Manager Bill Brenner's pinch-hit single gave the Broncos their three scores in the eighth.

Snapp Knocks Out Kennedy in Eight

Thirteen months absence from the ring robbed Jack (Ginger) Snapp of a good deal of his timing but not his lethal right hand that exploded behind Paul Kennedy's left ear last night at the Armory and left the Los Angeles Negro sitting on the canvas with a silly look on his face.

The knockout punch that came after 1:20 of the eighth round followed two seventh-round knock-downs that left the game Negro bent and tired.

Kennedy, as game as they come, showed flashes of boxing brilliance against the Merrill Mauler, but Snapp was too strong in the clinch-

es and carried too many bombs. Kennedy tried to find his feet at the count of 8 but all the strength was seeped from his body in the wake of a merciless beating that Snapp started to unleash in the third round.

Snapp's rustiness showed plainly in the first two rounds, particularly in the second, the only beat Kennedy won on the Herald and News scorecard with rat-a-tat-tat left jabs and looping body blows.

But Snapp started to find the range in the third round and rocked Kennedy with steaming right crosses to the chin after sharp left leads.

Ferrier Halfway Up On Rich Golf Prize

CHICAGO (AP) — Midway leader Jim Ferrier's gifted putter Saturday was a magic wand that beckoned golf's richest prize, the \$25,000 top money in the whirling "World Championship" fairways carnival.

Ferrier, massive ex-Australian who became a U.S. citizen in 1944, took a two-stroke lead over 1947

National Open Champion Lew Worsham into the third round of Tami O'Shanter's \$90,000, four-round circus.

Ferrier has dictated scorching rounds of 68-66 for 36-hole "scoop" of 134, ten under par. Big Jim's meteoric putter, however, only 27 times in Friday's 35 effort.

Worsham, who Friday wobbled to 71 from an opening 65, was a stroke ahead of Argentine Star Roberto De Vincenzo of Buenos Aires and Pete Cooper, White Plains, N.Y., knotted at 137. Cooper, co-leader with Worsham needed a second-round 72.

In the \$12,000 "World" Women's pro event, Betty Jameson of San Antonio, Tex., still had a bead on the \$5,000 first prize with a 36-hole total of 145, four strokes ahead of Patty Berg, the gallant shooter from Minneapolis.

The "World" Amateur was resolved into a hot scrap between Bill Campbell, 29-year-old former state legislator from Huntington, W.Va., and defending champion Frank Stranahan of Toledo, Ohio. Campbell's 136, fashioned on a pair of four-under-par 68's, gave him a two-stroke lead over Stranahan.

Joyce Ziske of Waterford, Wis., held a five-stroke lead over Betty Rowland of Lexington, Ky., 159 to 164, in the World's fourth phase, the Women's Amateur.
