She assisted her husband with the ranch work and also on cattle drives up until the time she became crippled as a result of a long-standing injury caused by being thrown from a horse. Of late years, she seldom left the ranch, but visitors to her home were always welcomed with genuine old-fashioned hospitality. Mrs. Streeter remained cheerful and lively until shortly before her death, her keen memory of people and events of the early pioneer days of the valley making her a most interesting conversationalist.

The body of Mrs. Streeter was shipped for interment in the family plot in Pleasant Hill cemetery, near Springfield, where graveside services were conducted by Rev. Claud O'Brien, August 1.
