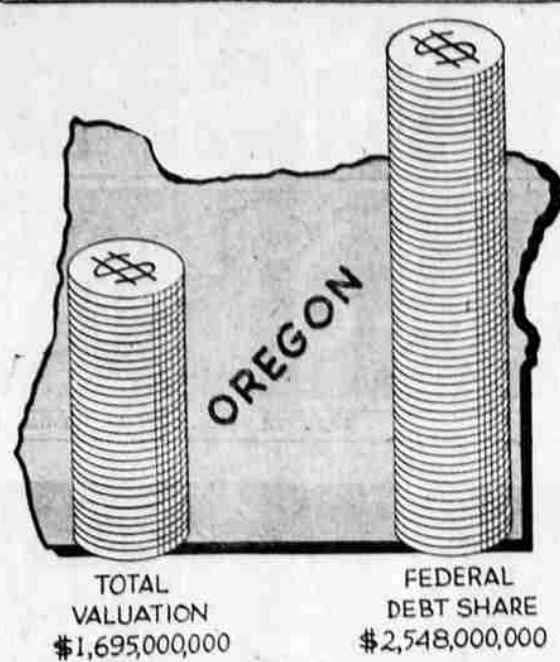

Eva Peron's Funeral Held Mossy Wins Iran Control

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP)—Argentine President Juan D. Peron shouldered today the burden of duties once shared by his wife Eva, who was buried yesterday with full presidential pomp.

The elaborate burial ceremonies, in which Peron participated, climaxed an unparalleled period of national grief and mourning since the President's wife died two weeks ago.

Her body rests temporarily in the Central Hall of the six-million-member General Confederation of Labor (CGT), a power which Peron built and which his wife ruled the last years of her life.

The burial hall will be closed to the public for a year while embalmers seek to give the body "corporeal permanence." Ultimately it will be placed on view in a huge monument to be built for her in the center of Buenos Aires.

Mrs. Peron's body was carried from the National Congress Building to the CGT Hall yesterday along a 27-block route packed with hundreds of thousands of mourning Argentines. A 21-gun salute sounded as she was laid to rest while the mourners, jammed into all nearby streets, stood motionless.

Peron, dressed in a general's uniform, walked with the nation's great behind a high coffin carriage bearing his wife's casket. Workers drew the carriage, and an honor guard of cadets, workers, and nurses marched beside it while Air Force planes roared overhead.

Peron earlier had announced he would take over personally the duties his 30-year-old wife handled before her last illness. His new work schedule, announced to start today, devote four afternoons each week to his wife's social welfare and labor duties.

Eleanor and Billy Rose Continue Divorce Fight

NEW YORK (AP)—Billy Rose has fired another verbal salvo at his estranged wife, Eleanor Holm Rose, who accused him of being a tightwad.

The thorny battle of the Roses has been seen-sawing back and forth ever since Mrs. Rose, the former swim star, sued for a separation. Rose launched a counter suit for divorce.

Adultery is the only ground for divorce in New York. The divorce case is scheduled to be heard next month. Mrs. Rose has been getting \$100 a week temporary alimony.

Ashland Sees Two New Plays

ASHLAND—Two of the most popular plays ever presented at the Oregon Shakespearean Festival and two virtual unknowns will be presented in the 1952 season, which will run for the entire month of August.

The old favorites are "The Taming of the Shrew" and "The Merchant of Venice." The lesser-known plays are "Coriolanus" and "Henry VI, Part 1."

"Merchant" was last presented at the festival in 1948 but has been given more often than any other of the Bard's works at the Ashland event. "Shrew," which held attendance records until last season's "Twelfth Night," set a new mark, was last presented in 1949 in Ashland.

The tragedy of 1953, "Coriolanus," is a powerful drama seldom produced because of the limitations of the modern stage. Producing director Angus Bowmer thinks that the play, which is somewhat similar to this year's "Julius Caesar," will go well on the festival's Ellensburg stage.

The same goes for "Henry VI, Part 1," which is almost impossible to do on a small stage. It is noted for Shakespeare's portrayal of King Henry, but is packed with battle scenes and action.

Meanwhile, requests for reservations for next season have already started to come in, the festival office reports. The first order came on July 31, the day before the 1952 season opened.

Escaped Prisoner Tired of Fleeing

SALEM (AP)—Alfred Neilsen, 24, a trusty who walked away from the state prison farm Thursday, telephoned Warden Virgil J. O'Malley Saturday and said he wanted to come back.
