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Pelton Dam Hearing Set

PRINEVILLE, Aug. 12—A spokesman for Portland General Electric Company said Tuesday that the State Hydroelectric Commission will be asked Thursday to hold public hearings on licensing construction of Pelton Dam.

The commission recently denied PGE permission to build the power dam on the Deschutes River in Central Oregon on the ground that it might reduce Lower Columbia River fish runs.

Earlier the Federal Power Commission had authorized construction.

The Prineville-Crook County Chamber of Commerce Tuesday approved a resolution asking the state commission to reconsider the PGE application.
