Mark Sullivan, Newsmen Claimed By Heart Attack

WEST CHESTER, Pa. (AP) — Mark Sullivan, 78, nationally-known newspaper columnist, died of a heart attack Wednesday night in Chester County Hospital.

In the newspaper business for 64 years, Sullivan was the author of several books, including his own autobiography, and once served as editor of Collier's magazine.

Sullivan was the youngest of 10 children. His parents were Irish immigrants who became prosperous Pennsylvania farmers.

Sullivan was a part owner of a newspaper at 19.

U.S. Lumber Expansion Due

SEATTLE (AP) — The federal government has set up a 50 million dollar program for a national expansion program of lumber and wood products facilities, said Philip M. Crawford, regional director of the Commerce Department, Wednesday.

Crawford said some 18 million dollars was slated for items to gain more complete use of wood wastes and improve related wood-products facilities.

About 20 million dollars more was set aside for expansion of sawmills and related facilities, he said.

Med School Bids Booted

PORTLAND (AP) — All bids for the University of Oregon Medical School teaching hospital were too high, the State Board of Higher Education said Wednesday.

Lowest of the four bids was \$4,184,169. It came from Donald M. Drake, Portland.

On the mechanical contract the low of five bids was \$1,232,263. The low bid on the heating plant was \$382,793 and on the electrical work \$434,000. Low on the elevator was \$359,150.

Dr. R. E. Kleinsorge, Silverton, chairman of the building committee, said all bids were far beyond available funds. The board asked architects to revise plans and report on Sept. 9.

Two Trustees Escape Prison

SALEM (AP) — Police and Oregon prison authorities Thursday hunted two trustees who escaped Wednesday while picking beans at the prison farm east of here.

The two were Charles P. Duncan, 39, sentenced last February from Benton County to two years for forgery, and Thomas E. McIntee, 31, sentenced from Lane County last January to three years for burglary.

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Tax Commissioner Defends Revenue Bureau

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Internal Revenue Bureau is sometimes charged with favoring certain taxpayers when it is only trying to collect all the taxes it can, says Commissioner John B. Dunlap.

Dunlap also said in an interview that—with the backing of his boss, Secretary of the Treasury Snyder—he is trying to let more light in on long secret aspects of the bureau's business.

But there are legal restrictions, Dunlap said, adding:

"I am not going to make decisions on matter who pushes, unless they are right, honest and it is for the best interest of the government, which includes its citizens."

This followed the release yesterday of Dunlap's reply to a critical telegram from James S. Pope of the Louisville Courier-Journal. Pope heads the Freedom of Information Committee of the American Society of Newspaper Editors.

When the revenue bureau settles a tax case for a few cents on the dollar, the people who pay in full are entitled to know of it," Pope said. "Yet under your new policy these transactions would remain secret if the bureau can keep them secret. The people have no FBI of their own to ferret out the names of favored tax evaders."

Dunlap promised, in his reply, to make public all applications from organizations asking tax-free status. But he declined, for the time being at least, to go beyond his previously announced policy for publicizing tax cases settled by compromise.

Applications for tax-free status, Dunlap said, will be made available during the bureau's reorganization, scheduled for conclusion by the end of the year.

A week ago Dunlap announced full details of tax compromises would be disclosed whenever a case was challenged in Congress. Other compromise settlements, he said, would remain where they were, locked in the bureau's secret files.

Sen. Williams (R-De) a frequent critic of the revenue bureau, contended it settles some delinquent accounts for a few cents on the dollar. Williams questioned whether any citizen could pay his taxes that way.

About compromise settlements, Dunlap said:

1. "The government never accepts a compromise for less than a person can pay and never compromises at all on how much a person should pay."

2. "The compromise settlement is a method, established by Congress, of taking what you can get. It offers relief to widows whose chief legacy was a tax debt, to sick and unemployed persons, to the bankrupt and other unfortunate. It is entirely different from the negotiated settlement."

3. "To protect the government's interest, we slap on lien to the full amount of the taxpayer's debt to the government. But there is no way to collect what a person does not have. For instance, if a person has holdings of a million dollars, and owes the government a million in taxes, we put liens on his property of a million. But if the property is mortgaged, the gov-
