

Caution Urged In Use Of New Wonder Drug Chloromycetin

WASHINGTON (AP) — The wonder drug Chloromycetin remains on the market — but with clear warnings attached to its use by physicians.

Under a government ruling announced yesterday, every package of it must henceforth carry an explicit caution to doctors against indiscriminate use or for minor infections and a warning of possible hazards under certain conditions.

The government feels, however, that the versatile drug "should continue to be available for careful use by the medical profession in those serious and sometimes fatal diseases in which its use is necessary."

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) had been faced with deciding about future use of the drug as a result of serious blood disorders, some of them fatal recently noted among people treated with the medicine.

There was even talk of a possible ban on the drug which, since 1949, has been used in more than eight million cases. It has been credited with saving thousands of lives from serious infections such as typhoid fever, Rocky Mountain spotted fever, undulant fever, epidemic typhus, "scrub" typhus, certain pneumonias and urinary tract infections. It is medicine's only known cure for typhoid.

But yesterday, the FDA announced its decision to permit the drug to remain on the market "under revised labeling that will caution physicians explicitly against its indiscriminate use." Packages of the drug will also contain information spelling out potential blood or intestinal hazards from "prolonged or repeated use" and calling for "adequate blood studies under such use." It can be obtained only on a doctor's prescription.

The FDA said its decision was based on the findings and recommendations of a special committee of top scientists in the field of blood studies and internal medicine appointed by the National Research Council at FDA's request.

B.C. Hit By Forest Fires

VANCOUVER, B.C. (AP) — Flaming forests pinned down an army 1,000 strong in British Columbia Thursday.

Altogether some 150 fires were burning throughout the province. The forest service described the fire situation as "the worst it's been this year."

No rain has fallen in B.C. for three weeks.

The three biggest fires, all out of control, have raced through an estimated 7,500 acres of timberland in the Okanagan Valley, the Cariboo and the Bella Coola Valley.

At Kelowna, hundreds of persons thronged the beaches of Okanagan Lake to watch flames devour 1,500 acres of forest on Blue Grouse mountain, eight miles away.

A 5,000-acre fire near Burn Lake in the Cariboo was reported to be penetrating deeper into rich timber stands, advancing about two miles every hour under a steady wind.

A 1,000-acre fire, meanwhile, continued to sweep ahead at Mosher Creek in the Bella Coola Valley, inland about mid-way between Vancouver and Prince Rupert.

Forest rangers were maintaining a close aerial watch over the rugged area but reports indicated it would be impossible to battle the flames from the ground.

More than 100 men were fighting the Blue Grouse fire. It started in an orchard near the summit and, at some points, has reached the 3,000-foot level of the mountain.

Children playing with matches were blamed with starting the fire. Towering columns of smoke were visible 10 miles away.

Tunnel Fire Halts Trains

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The Western Pacific Railroad said a freak fire burned out of control Thursday in one of its mainline tunnels in the high Sierra. The 20-mile stretch of the line, which carries two or three trains a day, was disrupted for two or three days, the railroad said.

The blaze broke out about midnight in the timbers of tunnel No. 9 in the Feather River Canyon, 20 miles east of Oroville, Calif., officials at the line's headquarters said.

It was touched off by sparks from a steam derrick working to clear the line of an 11-car freight derailed which occurred early Tuesday in the tunnel.

A W.P. spokesman said railroad and U. S. Forest Service crews were expected to control the fire shortly, but it would take longer to completely extinguish the flames and reopen the mainline.

Meanwhile, the railroad's California Zephyr streamliners were scheduled to be detoured in both directions over Southern Pacific rails between Sacramento and Winnemucca, Nev., a distance of 330 miles.

The W.P. said five of the 11 derailed cars were pulled from the 800-foot tunnel before the fire started.
