HOLLYWOOD (N)—No more tearjerkers for Jane Wyman. From now on, she wants happy pictures.

This may sound like biting the hand that has fed her very well. After all, it was the weepers that established her as a top Hollywood star. A downbeat yarn named "The Weekend" first showed producers that she could really act. She demonstrated she could handle character roles deftly when she played Ma Baxter in "The Yearling."

As a plain deal girl in "Johnny Belinda," she won one of those hands out last year. One year she snagged her third Oscar nomination with "The Blue Veil," which was strictly a four-handerchief epic.

"But audiences don't want to see pictures like those right now," she protested as we lolled beside her pale blue swimming pool. (Some lolling!) "They have enough troubles of their own, without going to see more problems on the screen. That's why I want to sing and laugh in the movies I make."

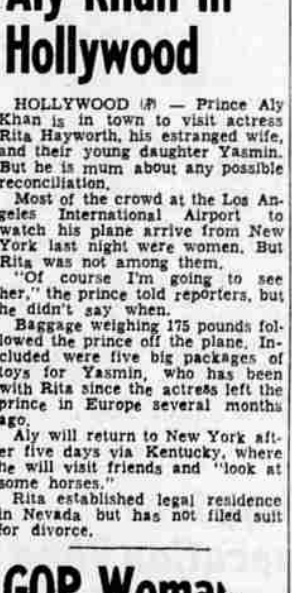
