Sackett To Ask TV Grant

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Sheldon F. Sackett, West Coast publisher and radio station operator, Friday announced plans to file applications for television stations in Walls, Wash., and Medford, Ore.

Sackett said the applications, to be filed within 10 days, will seek Communications Commission authority to build a 3,000 watt very high frequency transmitter at Walls, Wash. and a 500 watt VHF frequency station at Medford.

Both stations would telecast on channel 4.

Sackett, who will head both corporations, said equipment contracts have been signed. He estimated that the Walls station would cost \$400,000 and the Medford station \$350,000.

The applications will ask approval of the call letters KMTV for Medford and KWTW for Walls, Sackett said.

Sackett owns the Coos Bay, Ore., and radio stations KOOS in Coos Bay, and KVAN in Vancouver, Wash. He has applications on file with the FCC for television stations in Oakland, San Francisco, Portland-Vancouver and Coos Bay.

Diver Killed In Deep Sea Plunge

NAPLES, Italy (AP)—Giuseppe Giuliano, who held the unofficial Italian deep sea diving championship, drowned in Naples Bay yesterday when his diving apparatus failed.

The Naples diver won his title by diving 64 meters (about 210 feet) off the shore of Ischia Island to help float an American Flying Fortress shot down during World War II.

Truman Willing To Remain In Background

WASHINGTON (AP)—A friend of both President Truman and Adlai Stevenson said today that Truman would be willing to stay in the background of the coming presidential campaign for practical reasons.

"First, the President is a political politician and knows that Stevenson would be handicapped campaigning as a Truman understudy," this Democratic strategist told a reporter, with the stipulation that he not be quoted directly.

"Mr. Truman's main ambition now is to go down in history as a great President whose policies were continued. He knows that chance could be marred if a Republican is elected with a resulting change in major Truman policies."

This Democratic leader said Truman enjoyed saying publicly that he now is a buck private in the ranks after Stevenson's initial selection.

Red Shakeup In Hungary

BUDAPEST, Hungary (AP)—Martyr Rakosi, secretary-general of the Hungarian Communists, resigned his post of prime minister Thursday.

He had held the post of vice premier.

Istvan Dobi, former premier and member of the Smallholders party, resigned the speaker of the house announced. He then was given the job of president. (The job is a figurehead position in all Communist countries.)

Rakosi, who had been president of Parliament's presidium, the highest authority in the country, also resigned.

He had been the last representative of the former Social Democrats in Hungarian political life.

The right wing section of the party escaped from Hungary, for the most part, before or just after the merger of the Socialist and Communist parties.

Since then leftist elements among the Socialists who supported the merger had disappeared in the course of several purges.

Rakosi, in a speech after his inauguration as premier, told Parliament the shift did not mean any change in either domestic or foreign policies.

He stressed the need for "friendly connections" with the neighboring democracies. Communist countries, he added: "We remain loyal and resolute guardians of the peace pact and the Hungarian people are ready to say it with words and deeds."

Hart Mountain Sheep Studied

PORTLAND (AP)—Efforts to establish a herd of bighorn sheep in the Hart mountain antelope country were being started here Thursday.

Francis Lambert, long associated with the famed Order of the Antelope, a group of outdoor enthusiasts that meets yearly on the mountains, is back of it. He asked Oscar Chasman, secretary of the Interior, to permit a herd of 30 bighorns to be transferred from Nevada to the Hart refuge.

A dozen years ago, bighorn from Montana were brought to Hart Mountain but they did not survive. Lambert said they were weak. He said the sheep would be a major tourist attraction and would be welcomed by photographers who had hunted the antelope refuge.

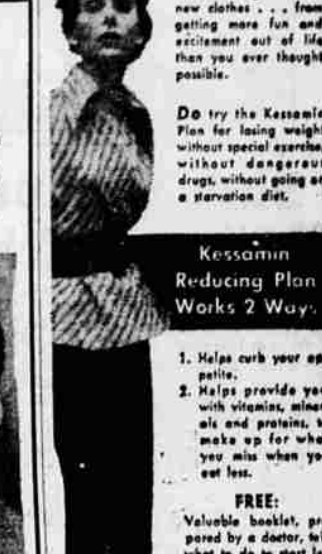
