

# Garver Sad, Wertz Happy Over Swap

## 8 Players Involved In Trade

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Bill Veeck's house cleaning of his St. Louis Browns finally reached hurler Ned Garver, sending the 30-game winner of last year to the Detroit Tigers for outfielder Vic Wertz in an eight-man waiver shift.

Veeck had a difficult decision to make in the deal which was completed yesterday.

Garver was the only Brownie bright spot with his 20-12 record as the club finished last in the American League last year. He was the first pitcher in the last 28 years of major league ball to turn such a trick with a tailender.

But the righthander hasn't shown any fire with just seven triumphs and 10 losses this year, and the Browns desperately need power at the plate which Wertz may supply.

Although hitting only .244 now, he has 17 home runs and has batted across 30 runs—more than any Brownie can claim. His homers

## U.S. Golfers Capture Lead In Americas Cup

SEATTLE (AP)—The United States had a fingerball grip on the brand new Americas Cup today and was banking on the steady play of its champion-studded team to pull it through the second and final day of action against the cream of Canadian and Mexican golf.

Harvie Ward of Toronto, N. C., teamed with Ken Venturi of San Francisco and Sam Urzetta of East Rochester, N. Y., with Joe Gagliardi of Larchmont, N. Y., to stack up four points yesterday. Canada collected three points and Mexico two as a pair from each nation opposed two others in three "six-some" matches.

And each duo played a single ball, alternating on shots. Today the teams were matched in singles, each man playing two others over the 36-hole route on the Seattle Golf Club's 6,632 up and down yards.

Finally it was his birdie putt on the 36th that closed out the match and gave Mexico its two points for the day.

## Suds Dampen Bevos' Hopes With Twin Win

The Seattle Rainiers, rebounding from a two-game setback, protected their fourth place Pacific Coast League standing Thursday night with a double victory over the on-rushing Portland Beavers.

The Rainiers took the first game behind six-hit pitching by Al Widmar 5-2. Art Del Duca scattered seven basebombs in winning the nightcap 4-2.

The Beavers, who had won two straight from the Rainiers, appeared on their way to a third victory in the first game until the sixth when Seattle unloaded for five runs. Larry Ward had a no-hitter until the fatal inning. Walt Judnich, Leo Thomas and Artie Wilson contributed nine of Seattle's

11 hits in the second game.

Thomas, an ex-Portlander enlivened both games.

He got into a fight with Ward in the first game, and was banished, then came back in the second to drive home two runs and figure in three of Seattle's four tallies.

Ward and Thomas tangled when Thomas was hit by a pitched ball.

At San Diego, Sacramento's Jesse Flores limited the Padres to two hits and beat them 4-0. Flores pitched to only 29 batters. He fanned seven and didn't walk a man.

San Diego's defeat dropped the Padres 4 1/2 games off the pace, since Oakland maintained its half-game lead by thumping Los Angeles again, 9 to 7, and second place Hollywood blanked San Francisco's Seals, 3 to 0.

## College Stars Brew Pass-for-Pass Plan

CHICAGO (AP)—If the Los Angeles Rams defeat the College All-Stars in the 19th game of the big football classic at Soldier Field Friday night it will be largely through the medium of spirit to win. No extra cash bonuses will be attached as an incentive.

Sources close to the National Football League champions, owned by six millionaires, are positive that there has been no promise of extra money. They say the Rams really want to win this one, but good.

A West Coast boy, medalist Tom Jacobs, Montebello, Calif., managed to squeeze in between Southerners to take over third place. Jacobs has 75-72-147.

Then come two more southerners, Larry Moore, Moultrie, Ga., and Don Bishpinoeff, Orlando, Fla., both at 148. Jim Lucius, Northfield, Minn., also is in striking distance of the lead with 148.

The first day leader, Roger Boyd, Tacoma, Wash., added a 77 Thursday to his first round of 72 for a 149 total.

Rounds of 18 holes Friday and Saturday will wind up the tournament, sponsored by the National Junior Chamber of Commerce. It is being played over the tree dotted 6600-yard long Eugene Country Club course.

Others transferred in the deal were outfielder Jim Delouis and relief hurler Dave Madison from St. Louis to Detroit. Earlier in the week, but part of the same package, pitchers Marlin Stuart and Dick Littlefield and outfielder Don Fenhardt moved to St. Louis from Detroit, and Detroit picked up pitcher Bud Black from the Browns' farm in San Antonio.

"I gained 11 games just like that and jumped out the cellar," he laughed, referring to St. Louis' higher standing. "From what I hear I will like working for Veeck. I think I'll hit better in St. Louis. I always liked that ball park—that right-center field fence is a good target."
