Costello Now Behind Bars

NEW YORK (AP) — Rackets kingpin Frank Costello awoke behind prison bars today for the first time in 27 years.

He surrendered yesterday to begin an 18-month federal prison term for contempt of the Senate, relaying these words to reporters: "Tell the boys I have come in to do my bit. I don't want no favors from nobody. I wanted to be treated like everybody else."

The 61-year-old gambler, described by the law as "the prime minister of the underworld," is to be eligible for parole in six months.

Allegheny Steel Corp. To Resume Production

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Allegheny-Ludlum Steel Corp. is making preparations Saturday to resume full production after signing a complete new contract with the CIO United Steelworkers.

The agreement, covering 14,000 workers in five plants, was reached Friday night.

Allegheny-Ludlum was the only major steel producer which had not recalled its employees under terms of an interim agreement ending a nation-wide steel strike July 25.

A company spokesman said Allegheny-Ludlum chose to remain idle until a complete contract was agreed upon.

Details were not announced, but sources close to both sides said the contract follows the general pattern set in the basic steel industry when the six largest producers agreed to the pact last month.

The interim agreement provides wage boosts averaging slightly more than 21 cents an hour. Average steelworker pay scale under the old contract was two dollars an hour.

The new contract expires June 30, 1954, with a reopening clause for wage negotiation at the end of the first year.

Allegheny-Ludlum has plants at Brackenridge and West Leechburg, Pa., and at Watervliet, Dunkirk and Buffalo, N. Y.

The strike-ending agreement was announced several hours after Jones and Laughlin Steel Company officials signed a complete new contract on which agreement had been reached 24 hours earlier.

Of the six big producers, only U. S. Steel remains to work out a new contract to replace the interim agreement.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) Friday announced his selection of principal and alternate candidates for Oregon for entrance next July in Annapolis and West Point.

Annapolis — Principal, Hugo E. Marver, Portland; Alternates, Charles E. Richardson Jr., Portland; Douglas L. Scott, Salem; Second alternate, J. R. Todd, Salem; Scio, and Leo E. Therrien, Coos Bay; Third principal, Gunnar E. Christiansen, Eugene; Alternates, Roger A. Chaney, Portland, and Bob Hickok, Portland. Fourth principal, Ken Larabee, Pendleton; Alternate, John Sumner, Heppner.

West Point — All from Portland except two alternates, Jerry Zabrackie, North Bend, and Don Edisson, Milwaukee.

New Highway Plan Studied

SALEM (AP) — Plans to create a new state motor vehicle department will be discussed by a Highway Legislative Interim Committee at its Sept. 1 meeting, according to work received at the state house from State Sen. Elmo Smith of John Day, committee chairman.

The new department would strip the secretary of state's office of 600 employees and the public utilities commission of 200 employees, consolidating the State's Motor Vehicle Bureau similar to the one proposed, collection costs are 2.8 per cent.

If the plan is adopted by the next Legislature and becomes law, the secretary of state's office would be left with only the accounting, audits, building and grounds and elections divisions to administer.

Smith said that a saving of \$1,000,000 yearly can be made in the collection of Oregon's \$50,000,000 highway revenue funds. He points out that collection costs in Oregon run 7 per cent of the total, while in Virginia, which operates with a motor vehicle bureau similar to the one proposed, collection costs are 2.8 per cent.

Air Guard For Alaska

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Air Force Saturday announced plans to establish the first Air National Guard organization in Alaska.

An air base squadron will be formed at Anchorage next month to recruit key personnel and set up equipment and training programs, and a territorial air guard headquarters will be opened in Juneau on Sept. 1.

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Yasmin, the 21-year-old daughter of Rita Hayworth and Aly Khan, was rushed to an emergency hospital Friday night after she accidentally swallowed sleeping pills.

The prince and the actress arrived at the hospital in separate cars, forgetting at least for a moment their marital difficulties.

The actress told hospital attendants she did not know how the child, who has been ill with whooping cough, obtained the pills. After her stomach was pumped out, Yasmin appeared to be none the worse for her experience. She was in the hospital about 15 minutes.

The Moslem prince had a three-hour visit at Rita's Beverly Hills home Friday. He described it as "most pleasant" but turned aside reporters' questions about a possible reconciliation.

Klamath, Calif. Critical Area

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Office of Defense Mobilization Friday designated new critical defense housing areas at Klamath, Calif., Colville, Wash., and Lake County, Ill.

Another at Roseburg, Ore., was enlarged.

The designations entitle the areas to the relaxation of real estate credit controls to encourage housing construction by private builders.

The housing and home finance agency shortly will specify the number of new dwellings to which lower down payment and mortgage terms may be applied and the maximum sales price or rental for each dwelling.

The Klamath area consists of Klamath Judicial Township including Klamath and Klamath Glen, Del Norte County, Calif. Enlarging the Roseburg, Ore., critical area previously created, ODM added the Civil Bend Precinct in which the Pacific Plywood Co. is located. The communities of Winston and Dillard in this precinct asked to be included in the critical area.

HEAT WAVE

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Guya and Dolls: Meet the first ex-waitress to make the grade as a glamour queen.

Britain's gorgeous Joan Rice, who hit moviegoers right between the eyes as Maid Marion in Walt Disney's "Robin Hood" and who will costar with Burt Lancaster in "His Majesty, O'Keefe," may have her biography changed by the time press agents get to her, but she told me:

"I wasn't anybody special. I did some nursing in a home for the aged and I worked as a waitress in London. A friend of mine who was doing extra work kept telling me to try movies. I finally went to an agent and he arranged a screen test. I've never had acting experience. I just take direction. It's all I can do."
