## Council Studies Ordinances; Police Judge Salary Raise

Last night's City Council meeting was short, primarily taken up with the reading of various ordinances and resolutions.

Final reading and approval was given an ordinance to place on the Nov. 4 ballot the proposition of raising the pay of the police judge additional pay would not necessitate a tax levy but would be paid out of the city's general fund.

Ordinances introduced included one allowing a contract between the City and the Klamath Basin Civic Service League for operation of the public lounge for another year (the lounge is financed partly by city tax money); and three regarding assessment rolls for improvement projects on Lowell, Painter and Lawrence streets.

There were no objections to the assessment rolls.

City Engineer E. A. (Taxi) Thomas was instructed to work out details for putting an access street from S. Riverside to Rogers, and to determine boundaries of assessment for the new street, and also was instructed to prepare specifications for improvement of the alley back of the Winema Hotel.

Southern Pacific Company was given authority to install two 200-watt lights on 30-foot poles at its railroad crossing on S. 6th across the street from Pacific Supply Co-operative.

The Moose Lodge was given permission to install colored "Protect Our Children" signs at each entrance to town, but also has to get Highway Department permission.

Only one bid was received for painting to be done at the south concrete hangar at the airport, that for \$600 from Roper and Roper. It was turned over to the Airport Commission.

The Council voted to ask state permission to retain J. H. Dyer as plumbing inspector for another year. He has reached retirement age.

A total of 5,100 of building permits was approved.

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## Fall Injures Local Woman

FORT KLAMATH—A fall from a horse about 2:30 p.m. Saturday put Mrs. Thomas H. (Betty) Hawkins, 35, wife of a prominent Fort Klamath stockman, in Klamath Valley Hospital with a broken leg.

Mrs. Hawkins, one of a party of seven, had been camping for a week at Seven Lakes, 15 miles west of Fort Klamath. The party was returning home when a pack horse broke loose, frightening the animals. Mrs. Hawkins' horse bolted between two trees, throwing her to the ground and against a boulder. Her right leg was fractured between knee and hip.

Hawkins rode from Grass Lake where the accident happened to the Stewart Nicholson ranch in the valley and called Dr. Raymond H. Engelcke, who rode back to the scene on horseback to give first aid.

Seven men, Ord Pritchett, Ralph Vaden, Fred L. Pope, Walter Wise,

Ben Corona, Fort Klamath; Dr. Harry Leonard, Klamath Falls; and Bob Boucke, Oakland, guests in the Hawkins home carried the injured woman over the six-and-one-half-mile trail in the dark to a waiting ambulance. The return trip took five hours.

Jack Apperson and Billy Vaden brought the pack horses out Sunday.

Mrs. Hawkins will be confined the hospital at least six weeks.
