Something entirely new for Klamath folks is being readied for a grand opening tomorrow night in the YMCA building here—a gathering of probably the finest hobbies from enthusiasts of all ages ever brought together in Southern Oregon.

Among the exhibits are Indian artifacts and relics from this locality, sets of model railroads and various other displays down through buttons, photographs and mineral and stamp collections. A panel of judges has been selected, lead by persons selected for their knowledge and interest in the varied fields included in the show.

Judges include Lou Hallock, Chief Ranger of Crater Lake National Park, an expert geologist and photographer and experienced in museum and exhibition work. Ruth King, newspaperwoman and an enthusiastic follower of the hobby groups; Miss Dolores Brackeen, Klamath County's new home demonstration agent, well posted in home hobbies; and Fred Lawrence, former news photographer and feature man for a New York metropolitan newspaper.

MEDFORD (AP)—The Rogue River Valley's Bartlett pear harvest is being carried on actively in all orchards now.

The yield is expected to be 23,000 tons, about 20 per cent under last year's figure and 15 per cent below normal.

The later varieties of pear, which make up the biggest part of the region's fruit crop will be harvested about two weeks from now.

Iranians Stone US Personnel

TEHRAN, Iran (AP)—Communists renewed street attacks on U. S. military personnel today, stoning two cars in which Americans were riding.

A spokesman for the American Army mission in Iran said "preliminary reports" indicated the rocks bounced off the body of one car without injuring two Army majors inside.

Other reports said rocks were thrown at another car in which a U. S. non-commissioned officer

was riding but the stones sailed harmlessly over the automobile.

There were growing indications that martial law, lifted only last week, would be reimposed shortly.

The government was forced to call out troops last night to quell Communist youths, wielding knives and rocks, who battled police and soldiers in the center of the city. Two policemen and one soldier were stabbed in the skirmish before the rioters fled under a tear gas attack.

It was the first time troops had been used since martial law was lifted.

The battle climaxed a series of nightly clashes between the Reds and members of Premier Mohammad Mosaddegh's Nationalist Front.

Arab Nations To Operate Own Defense Organization

CAIRO, Egypt (AP)—The seven Arab nations say they will put their own Middle East defense system into operation next month at a meeting of military commanders of the Arab League countries. The meeting, to be held around mid-September, was announced last night by League Secretary-General Abdel Rahman Azzam. A collective security pact signed in

September, 1950, by the seven nations—Egypt, Syria, Lebanon, Jordan, Iraq, Saudi Arabia and Yemen—goes into effect next Saturday.

One clause of the treaty says, "Any armed aggression against one or more of the pact's members or its forces is an attack on all to be met with armed forces." The Arab pact is distinct from the Middle East defense command proposed last October by the U. S., Britain, France and Turkey. Egypt turned the idea down then but the Western Powers still hope to work out such an arrangement. The new Egyptian reform government has not rejected the plan specifically and has invited offers of arms from foreign powers. Previously Arab sources suggested, unofficially that the Arab League defense alliance might take care of Middle East defense for the West.
