## New UP Agent In Klamath

James G. Johnson, formerly of Portland is district freight and passenger agent of the Union Pacific here, replacing John E. (Jack) Atherton, who has been transferred to Eugene.

Atherton will be general agent at Eugene, under the supervision of the Portland U.P. office and Traffic Manager C. W. Evers.

Here in Klamath Falls Johnson will be under supervision of the railroad's Sacramento office.

Johnson has been with UP since 1937 and until his transfer here was foreign freight representative at Portland, handling import and export traffic. Part of his work included the importation of Philippine mahogany into this country and to Klamath Falls by the Palmerton Lumber Company.

Atherton was stationed here almost seven years.

## Italian Atom Research Slim

MILAN (AP)—Italy has started its research for an experimental atomic stockpile in mostly basement quarters next to a "room for rent" sign.

It is a modest beginning—with "home made" heavy water, a tiny quantity of locally obtained mineral uranium, eight professors, some 30 student research assistants and about \$100,000.

Unlike the great secret American atomic cities, visitors need no special passes and there are no gun-bristling guards at the doors of the CISE (Centro Informazioni Studi Esperienze) laboratories, the organization for Italian atomic study.

The center is financed by a dozen of Italy's major industries. Professors directing the work say that the \$100,000 is about one-one-hundredth of what they need for really advanced experiments.

But they take hope from increasing government interest at Rome where late in July the research was placed under control of a government agency on nuclear energy.

Minister Pietro Campilli of commerce and industry announced that Italy expects to receive financial aid from the United States to help with the studies.

Goal of the research center is to establish a sufficient atomic stockpile to permit experiment and studies. Directors said they already have set up the necessary equipment to get the stockpile started.

Essential "heavy water" is being made electrically. Metallic uranium is being extracted from uranium-bearing ores which are found in Italy but not in quantity sufficient to justify normal mining.

## Best Orchard Claim Made

The "best orchard in Klamath County" is claimed now by Feliberto Laurento, Malin farmer who has apples, peaches, apricots and plums growing on rocky hill land.

Laurento said he had apricots ripening in July and has some apples and other fruit ripe now with more varieties to come along later.

Several apple trees are being broken down by the weight of the fruit, he says.

Ordinarily Klamath County produces very little fruit, but attempts at fruit growing are becoming more common.

Part of his orchard is alongside the state highway, planted on land which is being used as the highway right-of-way but which he owns and the state never bought, Laurento says, and consequently he has a problem in keeping motorists coming along the road from stopping to help themselves to his apples.

## 'Valentino 2nd' Says He Prefers Character Parts

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—(NEA)—The Man! Let exhibitors yowl for a modern Valentino to bring the housewife rushing back into the movie theaters—Fernando Lamas wants no part of being the heavy-lidded, burning-eyed answer to love's unrequited women.

Fernando doesn't mind an occasional nibble at the white shoulders of a movie queen like Lana Turner in "The Merry Widow," but says: "I would hate to be typed in romantic roles. It hurts tremendously and it's not good for a long career. I'm playing a gangster in 'The Girl Who Had Everything.' The character roles are juicier."

Is Fernando pained when dolls throw themselves at his feet, yank at his shirt and scream "Lover Boy!"

"Bless the screaming women," he said. "They buy tickets to theaters. The day they stop swooning or crowding around me in the street, I'll know I'm through. I hate actors who pretend they're annoyed at admiring women. It's a lot of baloney."

Cameron Mitchell's beaming over his escape from being tagged "the poor man's John Garfield," now that he's red-hot in the versatile acting league at Fox. He's playing another meaty role—the part of an insane doctor in "Powder River"—and tells me:
