Three Saved From Cavern After Trapped By Cave-in

ABERDARE, Wales (AP) — Two Boy Scouts and their injured scoutmaster, trapped in a mountain limestone cave were dragged alive to safety today by rescuers who hacked their way through a nine-foot wall of boulders.

The hard-bitten Welsh coal miners worked through the night to free the trio who were entombed 20 hours inside the dank, ice-cold cavern known as Bridge Cave.

All three were rushed to a hospital. A police officer said they appeared in "reasonably good condition."

Only Scoutmaster Jim Case, 40, was believed in a serious condition. His legs were crushed when four tons of rock gave way to cut off the tail end of a nine-man scouting party exploring the cave yesterday.

Six other scouts in the exploring party barely escaped when the cave gave way as they were crawling out chain-style.

Crawling on their stomachs, rescuers chopped away with sledge hammers and pickaxes at the wall of rock sealing the exit for the trio. The cave, 1,500 feet up a mountain, was filled with water holes which slowed efforts to get to the trapped trio.

The two youths—Max Phillips, 21, and Michael Briscoombe, 17—

had managed to extricate their scoutmaster, who was first reported pinned by a boulder.

A 20-foot-deep river running through the cave forced the scouts to move around cautiously in a cramped passage only two feet high and two feet wide. They boosted the scoutmaster on a ledge when fears arose that the river might rise.

The rescuers were in contact with the scouts most of the time, and a tiny crevice gave them an opening to supply aid. Morphine was rushed through the hole for the injured man. Later hot tea and blankets were passed through.

The scouts kept their spirits up, bolstered by shouts of encouragement from the rescuers.

"We know you are doing your best," the youths called back repeatedly to give assurance that they were still alive.

Dr. A. J. Hudson, 34, a cave explorer himself, shouted first aid instructions for the two scouts to apply to their scoutmaster.

The rescue parties had to inch themselves along a narrow two-foot-high passage bordering a deep pool to reach the fallen rock. By the light of miner lamps they shored up the tottering roof of the cave with steel pit props as they hacked frantically at the wall of rock and rubble.

Winchester Bay Reported Dangerous Fishing Area

REDFORT, Ore. (AP) — The Coast Guard commander here pointed to the Saturday capsizing of a Coast Guard motor lifeboat as a warning to fishermen that the Umpqua River bar is dangerous when small craft warnings are flying.

Winchester Bay at the river's mouth has long been recognized as an excellent but hazardous area for sports fishermen. Boatswain A. F. Jensen, commanding the station here, said this was what happened Saturday.

Unusual breakers developed at flood tide and several skiffs and 11 charter boats were held outside the harbor for several hours. They finally all got in, helped either by the Coast Guard or by commercial trollers. One 14-foot skiff, carrying

three tourists, was taken aboard a Coast Guard boat and brought in because the breakers were too rough for towing.

The 36-foot motor life boat had three coastguardsmen aboard when it capsized. One man was thrown clear but he regained the boat and helped the other two right it. No gear was lost.

Game commission representatives said 191 salmon were brought in by 17 charter trolling boats and 49 were brought in from 119 skiffs. Most of the salmon were Silvers, with some Chinooks, caught in the river inside the bar.
