Republicans Veto McCormick Plan For Creating New Party

Col. Robert R. McCormick, a lifelong Republican, who has repudiated his party and its presidential nominee, and has called for the organization of a new political party, received general negative reaction, even from Republican congressmen he does endorse.

One Republican senator — not on the Chicago Tribune publisher's favored list — used the word "screwball" in commenting on McCormick's radio speech Saturday.

Taft Support Qualified

CLEVELAND (AP) — The Cleveland News said Monday that Senator Robert A. Taft will campaign for Dwight D. Eisenhower for president only if the general supports certain "major issues."

The newspaper's political editor, Jack Kennon, said he had learned: "Senator Taft, who is vacationing in Murray Bay, Canada, does not want to take the stump for Eisenhower and risk repudiation by the candidate on any of the major issues which Taft has advocated outpokenly."

The story, said Kennon, was obtained from an individual "very close to Taft, a person active in Taft's political fortunes."

Kennon said Taft wants to know:

1. Where Eisenhower stands on the Taft-Hartley labor law, which Taft co-sponsored.
2. Whether Eisenhower is sincere regarding a \$60,000,000 budget ceiling for the federal government by 1954.
3. "Most important," where Gov. Thomas E. Dewey — Taft's three-time rival for the Republican presidential nomination and an influential fixture in Eisenhower's nomination — fits into the Eisenhower campaign.

MGM Takes Gamble With Negro Cast

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The film studios are supposed to be betting only on sure things these days. It's a current Hollywood maxim to take no chances. There is one exception to this movement to satisfy the known public demands for orthodox film entertainment. Oddly enough, the picture is being made at MGM, home of glossy musicals and star-packed spectacles.

The film is called "See How They Run" and it is the first non-musical made by a major studio with an all-Negro cast. Its producer, Sol Fielding, admits that the venture is a financial gamble.

The Negro audience will just about pay for the cost of the picture, he estimated. "If it has enough quality to attract a segment of the white audience, it might make a profit."

The whole project began in the mind of a young Negro school teacher, Mary Elizabeth Vroman of Montgomery, Ala. She tried her hand at writing a short story concerning the experiences of a teacher in a Negro school. She sent it, along with a pleading letter, to the Ladies Home Journal. The magazine printed both.

Last year, the story was cited by a Christopher Award and brought to the attention of MGM. The studio bought the story and assigned Emmet Lavery, author of "The Magnificent Yankee," to turn out a script. Signed for leading roles were night club singers Dorothy Dandridge and Harry Belafonte, plus Philip Heuburn, an 11-year-old veteran of Broadway shows, including "Finian's Rainbow."

But unlike the other two all Negro films of recent years—"Cabin in the Sky" and "Stormy Weather"—"See How They Run" is not a musical, nor is a story of Negro-white relations, as were "Home of the Brave" and "Pinky." "Lost Boundaries" and "Intruder in the Dust."

"See How They Run" is the story of a boy in the third grade, said producer Fielding, a former newspaper artist and foreign correspondent. "It could take place any place and to a boy of any race. But some of the events have more significance because they happen in a Negro community. There will be only one white actor in the cast, a doctor.

"We are taking a chance, not only because it has a Negro cast, but also because it does not have the climaxes of most film dramas.

While the investigation was going, with Evans being cited for parking on the highway, a 1941 Chrysler driven by Warren, traveling along the highway, struck the rear end of a 1948 Hudson driven by John Herbert O'Brien, 2140 Gettle, and he careened against the patrol car. The damage was minor, but Warren was arrested and charged with drunken driving.

Another car coming along at the accident scene was being driven erratically, State Police said, and the driver, Richard Dickens, was arrested.

Also lodged in the jail Sunday night was Glenn Ellsworth Johnson, 24, Chemult, charged with failure to stop at the scene of an accident. His car allegedly sideswiped another on US 97 near Modoc Point.
