(AP) — Its defending champion unceremoniously rubbed from the running, Canada pinned its hopes Wednesday on Rick "The Wedge" Westlock of Windsor, Ont., and hitting Bill Mawhinney of Vancouver, to keep its National Amateur Golf crown from the grasping hands of a sharpshooting United States delegation.

Westlock, biased over the drying fairways of the Capilano course Tuesday to card an eight-under-par 64, only two shy of the course record, and Mawhinney left his hospital bed to score a 6 and 5 victory over George Andrews of Victoria, B. C.

Robert Ross, determined department store owner from San Francisco, was the man who upset the local applicant. He carved out a 5-0 lead over champion Walt McElroy of Vancouver in the first nine holes and held on for a 3 and 2 victory.

Campbell bumped Mel Galletta of St. Albans, N. Y., in the feature match of the day, 2 and 1. Ed Johnston found the course to his liking and carved five strokes off par for the 18 holes he needed to defeat R. W. Porter of Vancouver, B. C., 10 and 8.

PORTLAND (AP) — Most of the favorites were still in the picture but the ax falls twice Wednesday as 32 contestants head into the second and third rounds of match play in the Women's National Amateur golf championship.

Leading the parade, and doubtless the most reliable favorite in the field, was the defending champion and medalist from Atlanta, Dorothy Kirby.

Playing over the 6,323-yard Par 36-37-73 Waverley Country Club course, the field will be cut to eight by nightfall.

Several matches were outstanding.

Champion Dorothy, who played well enough but hardly up to her own standard Tuesday in winning a 4 and 3 decision over Mrs. Frank T. Fisk of Portland, led off against Mary Agnes Wall, of Menominee, Mich.

Then there was the battle of the teen-agers—14-year-old Anne Quast of Everett, Wash., and 19-year-old Pat Lesser, Seattle. Tall Anne registered the day's biggest surprise Tuesday when she ousted Mrs. Lyle Bowman of Richmond, Calif., 18 and 17.

Other topflight girls still on hand include Polly Riley, Fort Worth; Barbara Romack, Sacramento; Grace DeMoss, Corvallis, Ore.; Mary Lena Paulk, Thomasville, Ga.; and Edean Anderson, Helena, Mont.

Lost from the tournament was 15-year-old Berridge Long, Huntington, W. Va. Berri, a sensation in the recent Western Amateur, fell before Spokane's pretty 18-year-old Connie Oldershaw, 3 and 2.
