

Jelke Claims Innocence In New York Vice Racket

NEW YORK (AP) — Minot F. (Mickey) Jelke III, heir to the \$100,000,000 Jelke fortune, pleaded innocent to an indictment charging he forced two pretty models into prostitution and accepted money from one.

The 22-year-old socially registered playboy, if convicted on all counts against him, would face a possible 16 to 134 years in prison and a \$31,000 fine.

Grand jury action against Jelke and three others was taken yesterday in the city's vice case. Jelke was sentenced to 30 days in jail and fined \$100 for beating up a 5500 night. Officials said the investigation was continuing.

One of those accused with Jelke pleaded guilty to a charge that he received prostitution earnings. He is 39-year-old movie bit-part actor Richard Wallace, also known as Richard Short. Sentencing was set for Sept. 9.

Jelke was named on eight counts of procuring, compulsory prostitution and living off prostitution proceeds. He also is charged with illegal possession of a gun.

It was specifically charged that he induced 19-year-old Patricia Ward to "live a life of prostitution" on her earnings from Sept., 1951, to March, 1952.

Miss Ward has been held as a material witness in the case. New York newspapers have said she broke the vice case after Jelke fled her.

The indictment did not mention his receiving money from her but said that he received \$100 from Wallace. The district attorney's office has said Miss Thompson, also held as a material witness, had paid Wallace \$300 a week for "love and affection."

Union Leader Gets Jailed

PORTLAND (AP) — William E. Benz, port agent for the AFL Sailors Union of the Pacific, Tuesday was sentenced to 30 days in jail and fined \$100 for beating up a merchant seaman two weeks ago.

George Bomareto, 28, received a similar sentence for his part in the shipboard beating of Harold Kyle.

Benz said that Kyle had caused trouble aboard the ship and had fought with other crewmen.
