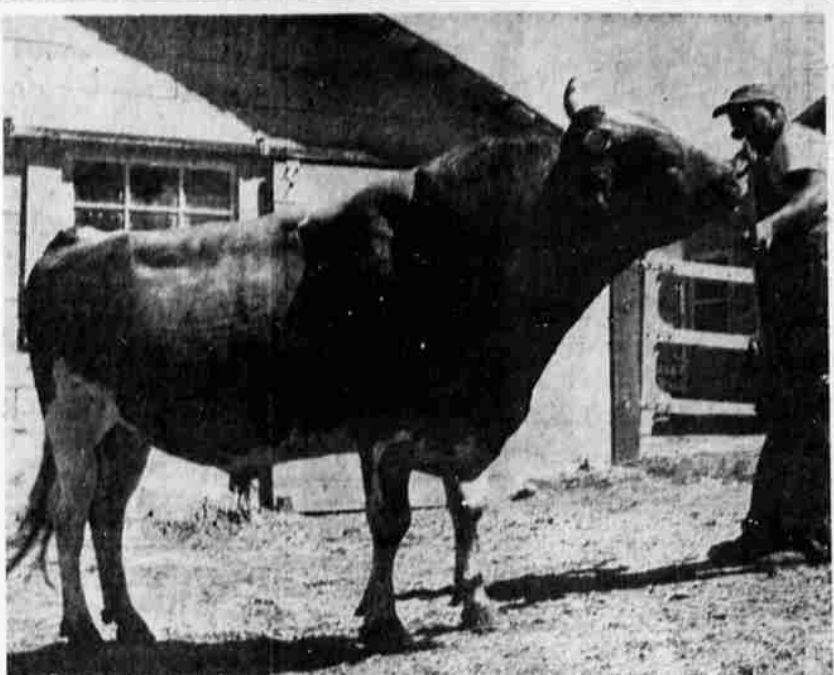

Chlorosis Test Underway

Control of iron chlorosis in trees with applications of ethylenediamine tetra-acetic acid (EDTA) holds considerable promise but is still in the experimental stage. Farm Advisor Ken Baghot reported yesterday.

Dr. Louis Jacobson, University of California, discovered that EDTA, a chemical that is made in large quantities for industrial purposes, forms a stable complex with iron, that has given good results when applied as a spray to chlorotic pear trees. Applications by a pear grower in Santa Clara County in the past season have given results so encouraging that this grower plans to expand the trials next year.

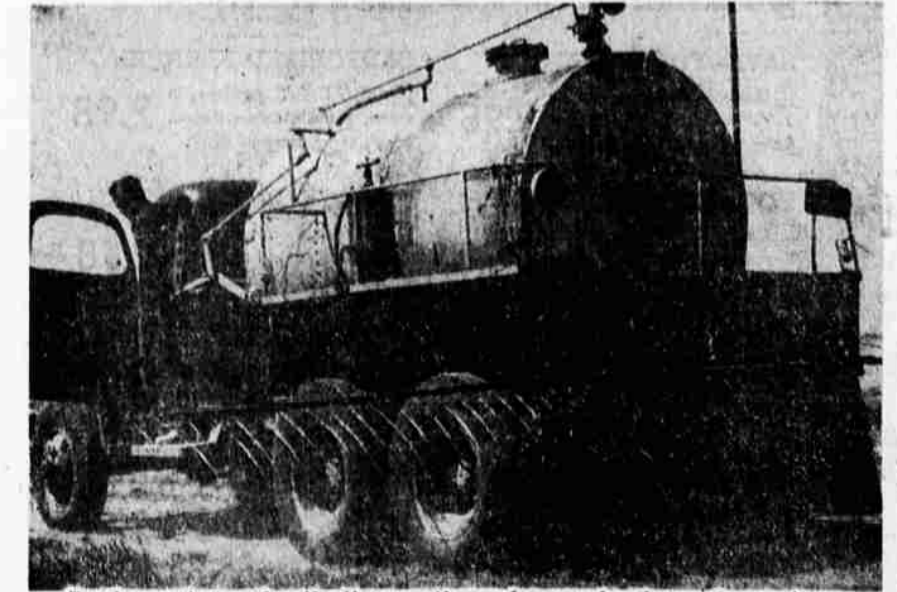
