Adlai Slates 7600 Mile Train-Plane Election Campaign Trip

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP)—A 7,600-mile plane-train campaign tour through nine Western states is planned by Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson, the Democratic presidential nominee's headquarters announced last night.

The swing into the West will open at Denver on Sept. 5, Stevenson will give a televised speech the night of Sept. 5 after meeting during the day with supporters from 11 Western states.

He will return to the Midwest on Sept. 6 for a major farm speech at the National Plowing Contest at Kasson, Minn. Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, Republican presidential nominee, also is booked to speak at Kasson the same day.

From Kasson, Stevenson will fly into Wyoming and Montana. Wilson Wyatt, Stevenson's campaign manager, said stops are tentatively booked for Cheyenne, possibly Casper, Wyo., and for Billings, Mont.

The tentative schedule calls for Stevenson to make stops in both Portland, Ore., and Seattle, Wash., on Sept. 8. On Sept. 9, he is booked to make a major speech in San Francisco. On the following day he will board a train at San Francisco for a "whistle stop" trip down the San Joaquin Valley. The train is to arrive in Los Angeles the night of Sept. 10 but Stevenson's speech in Los Angeles is booked for Sept. 11.

Leaving Los Angeles on Sept. 12 by plane, the governor and his party plan stops during the day at Phoenix, Ariz., and Albuquerque, N. M.

Philippine Pact Starts

MANILA (AP)—The United States-Philippines Mutual Defense Pact was put into effect today, but U. S. Ambassador Raymond Spruance made it clear the U. S. originally intended that Pacific security agreements follow approval of the Japanese Peace Treaty.

Acceptance of the pact by the United States had wanted re-establishment of relations with Japan as a prerequisite to creation of a system of regional security in the Pacific.

"However, as the United States does not desire that there be any doubt as to the reality of its intention to regard aggression against the Philippines as a menace to its own peace and safety, I've been directed to proceed with this exchange of ratifications today," Spruance declared.

US Silver Banned By PO

VICTORIA, B. C. (AP)—The Victoria Post Office has declared a ban against U.S. coins.

Customers Tuesday were politely informed that they should change their coins into Canadian at the nearest bank. U.S. paper currency, however, was still being accepted at the discount of five per cent.

Postmaster John B. Sinclair said the reason for the ban was that the banks were charging eight per cent for handling of all U.S. silver. The Post Office has decided that the only practical way is to refuse U.S. silver entirely.
