Salmon Planted In Odell

PORTLAND (AP) — The famed Atlantic salmon has been planted in Oregon water by the State Game Commission.
Tankers have hauled 2,500, ranging from 5 to 9 inches in length, to Odell Creek which is the outlet to Odell Lake and tributary to Davis Lake near the Willamette Highway.

The Atlantic salmon, highly regarded for its fighting qualities and tendency to strike freely at an artificial fly, were reared at the Wizard Falls fish hatchery from eggs given as a gift to Oregon by the Quebec Department of Game and Fisheries.

Another 3,000 Atlantic salmon are being reared at the Klamath hatchery.
The Atlantic salmon released here are sea-run rather than the form known as land-locked. However the New York Conservation Department has reported success in planting sea-run salmon in land-locked lakes.

The Oregon commission believes Davis Lake is a good food supply area and Odell Lake is a good place for the salmon to establish themselves.
Unlike the Pacific salmon, Atlantic salmon do not die after spawning.

Dot Kirby Upset By Anderson

PORTLAND (AP) — Youth takes over for the departed champion Thursday as eight players hook up in the quarter-finals of the Women's National Amateur golf championships.

Dot Kirby, the 1951 winner, left the ranks, beaten, 4 and 3, by long-hitting Edean Anderson, the current Canadian champion whose home is in Helena, Mont.
Dorothy's departure left the championship wide open, and the field dominated by young golfers.
The age ladder listed 17-year-old Barbara Snook of Portland; three 19-year-olds, Pat Garner of Midland, Tex., Barbara Romack, Sacramento, and Pat Lester of Seattle; Shirley McFeters, Long Beach, California, 21; Miss Anderson, 22; and two more mature players, Claire Doran, Cleveland, and Mrs. Jacqueline Punz, golfing mother from Hawaii.

Miss Anderson, a stocky, strawberry blonde, supplied the big punch in defeating the Georgia champion, but there were other surprises before the two rounds were completed Wednesday.
Barbara Snook, former Oregon junior champion, defeated former California queen Marjorie Ferris of Long Beach, on the 19th, and then eliminated Curtis Cup player Mae Murray, Rutland, Vt., 3 and one.

Long Beach was still represented by Miss McFeters, Southern California Public Links champion. Shirley downed Spokane's Connie Oldershaw, 3 and 2, and then defeated beautiful Bonnie Randolph of Linworth, O.

Olson Stops Hairston, Clamors for Robinson

NEW YORK (AP) — Carl (Bobo) Olson had his sixth straight victory today and a burning desire to fight Middleweight Champion Sugar Ray Robinson again.
The clever, 24-year-old Hawaiian chalked up No. 6 with a six-round technical knockout over sturly Gene (Silent) Hairston of New York in Madison Square Garden last night. It was a very impressive performance.
Olson staggered the 23-year-old

Negro deaf-mute with a right to the temple in the third round and opened a deep cut over his right eye in the fourth round. That was the beginning of the end. Bobo scored one left after another at the wound, blazed over thumping rights to the head, and then barged his game rival's body to keep him guessing.
Dr. Vincent Nardiello ordered the bout halted after the sixth as the blood-crazed Hairston wobbled to his corner.

"We'd like to get Robinson again," said Manager Sid Flaherty as Olson nodded in assent. "Robinson won a close one the last time. The next time it won't be close. Bobo will win going away."
"If we can't get the champion, we'd like Jake LaMotta or anyone the International Boxing Club can get for us."

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Ten U.S. Golfers in Canadian Amateur

VANCOUVER, B. C. (AP) — A posse of straight shooting bombers from south of the border had Canada's Amateur Golf championship and U.S. Amateur Golf championship on Thursday as the last 16 survivors hit the tumpy trail to the semi-finals of the 1952 tournament.

A plain pathway through the hilly Capilano golf course Wednesday and paved it with busted pars.
Just six Canadians remained in the scrap for Thursday morning's sixth round. With the field to be cut in half by noon, the eight still present then will play the 18-hole quarter-finals to pare the list to four by nightfall.

Shields, the New York state champ from Albany, racked up nine birdies in 14 holes as he walloped Lorne Smith of Dartmouth, N. S., 5 and 4.
