HARTFORD, Conn. (AP) — Gov. John Lodge Friday appointed William A. Purtell, a Republican, to the Senate vacancy caused by the death of Sen. Brien McMahon, Democrat. He will serve until next January. Purtell, West Hartford manufacturer, is the GOP nominee for the full six-year term, and will oppose the Democratic incumbent, Sen. William Benton, next November in that race. A permanent successor to McMahon, who died July 28, will also be elected in November to finish out the final four years of McMahon's term. Democrats and Republicans will hold special conventions next week to nominate for the short term.

Over 1,000 people are expected to attend the event.

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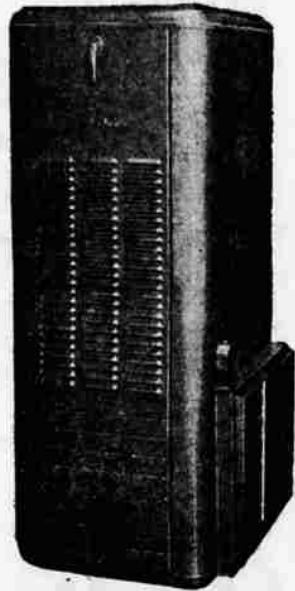
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
