# Man Clips Former Boss

A former employe of the Bragg service station, 2340 S. 6th, who clipped owner Frank Bragg on the jaw yesterday morning, is held in the County Jail on a charge of assault and battery.

He is William Leonard DeVoss, 38, of 5016 Johns. DeVoss was arrested last night by Deputy Sheriff Dick Finnell after Bragg swore out the assault and battery complaint.

Bragg said that the attack was unprovoked, that he was working at the station and saw DeVoss drive up across the street and get out of his car. Moments later, Bragg said, he was struck from behind. His left jaw was fractured.

DeVoss' bail was set at \$250 and he is to plea to the charge Tuesday morning in District Court.

# Local Schools Start Tuesday

Monday is the last day of vacation for about 8,000 grade and high school students in Klamath County, and Tuesday morning things get underway in earnest in 23 schools.

Yesterday KUIS, 17 a high school learned what high school had in store for them in an orientation session, and new junior high students reported to Fremont School.

Tuesday every school in the county is supposed to open its doors. Klamath Union High School, Fremont Junior High and county schools have slated full day operations, while city elementary schools go for just part of the morning that first day.

The county schedule is to start at 9 a.m., along with Sacred Heart Academy. Here in town, the high school is to open classes at 8:30 a.m., junior high gets underway at 8:40. Conger and Pelican classes take up at 8:45, all other grade schools start classes at 9 a.m.

The guard fired after a prisoner threw a sanitation bucket at him, the report said. The shot hit the bucket-thrower and two other prisoners.

## LIVESTOCK

**CHICAGO (AP)** — Hog prices declined at its lowest level since late in June. Continued narrow shipping outlets, with outgoing shipments less than half a year ago, and weakness in dressed pork combined to force live hog quotations down.

Barrows and gilts closed the week 50 cents to \$1.00 lower. Sows ended 25 to 50 cents down. Pork loins dropped as much as \$2.00 a hundred pounds at New York and \$6.00 at Chicago.

Choice and prime steers and yearlings wound up the week mostly steady, but other grades had losses running to 50 cents. Cows lost 75 cents to \$1.00. Bulls and vealers, finished steady.

In the sheep yards, high good to prime spring lambs lost \$1.00 to \$1.50 while other grades tumbled \$1.50 to \$2.00 or more.

# VA Outlines Loan Policy

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The Veterans Administration Saturday outlined the six steps a veteran must follow to obtain a GI loan for a home, farm or business.

The agency pointed out that under a new law more than one million veterans who have seen military service anywhere in the world since the Korean war started June 27, 1950, are now eligible for such loans.

The new law—the Korean GI bill—also provides education, training, unemployment and other benefits for veterans with service since June 27, 1950.

The VA said its regional offices throughout the nation are now issuing certificates of loan eligibility to qualified veterans, and are processing applications for loan guarantees.

The six major steps to a GI loan, VA said, are:

1. Find the property or business you want to buy, or decide on the business you want to establish.
2. Go to a bank, building and loan association or other financial institution from which you want the loan.
3. Present your plan and your original discharge or separation papers.
4. The property, if any is involved, will then be appraised by VA-approved appraisers.
5. The VA will send a certificate of reasonable value to the lender.
6. The lender, if the application is approved, will then make the loan.

# McCarthy Back To Hospital

**WASHINGTON (AP)**—Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy—"feeling fine" but still "a little weak" after an operation—goes back to the hospital today, but only for a few days.

After a physical checkup and possible further treatment at the Naval Hospital in Bethesda, Md., he plans to return to Wisconsin Wednesday.

McCarthy is seeking renomination in Wisconsin's Republican primary Sept. 9. Yesterday he told a reporter he will campaign for both Dwight D. Eisenhower and Sen. Richard Nixon, who have said they will endorse McCarthy for another term if he is renominated. He said this would not imply endorsement of all of McCarthy's views.

"I'm going to campaign for the whole Republican ticket," McCarthy said. "It is of the utmost importance that we have a change. It would be a catastrophe for a man like (Adlai E.) Stevenson to be elected to the presidency."
