

TENNIS MEET IN FULL SWING

Opening Matches Go Today

BULLETIN
Officials of the Herald and News-YMCA tennis tournament learned late last night that Don Megale would not be here to defend his title. Megale has been in bed with the flu and, although he's on the road to recovery, his doctor said he could not make the trip.

Some 30 tennis players in six divisions made opening bids today for Herald and News-YMCA trophies that will go to winners and runners-up after finals Monday in the three-day annual tournament at Moore Park.

Defending Champion Don Megale of Coos Bay ruled favorite to keep his title when opening matches started this morning on Moore Park's six courts.

Doubles Champions Don Dillingham and Bud Gilmore of Gillingham Pass are not on hand to defend their title.

The Hollywood Stars are beginning to apply more pressure in the final drive for the Pacific Coast League championship.

In other games Friday night, Portland nosed out Sacramento, 2-1, and San Diego dropped Seattle, 8-4.

San Diego banged 12 hits off three Seattle pitchers and increased its hold on third place in the standings by two full games. Grumpy Guy Fletcher, who started for the Padres, gave way in the fourth to Theophil Smith, who had the Rainiers in control the rest of the way.

Portland and Sacramento each got five hits. Marino Pieretti of Portland gave way to Royce Litt in the ninth and he vacated in favor of Lyman Linde as manager. Clay Hopper alternated his left and right handers to suit the requirements of the situation.

A's Late Threat In Tight American Race

The New York Yankees and the Cleveland Indians, separated by only one game in the rugged American League pennant race, were casting a wary eye over their shoulders today at Jimmy Dykes' Philadelphia Athletics.

Dykes' darlings, like the St. Louis Cardinals of another era, are up to their usual late season shenanigans. In the past the A's got too late but this time they have a chance to go all the way in the stretch run.

Yesterday, as Cleveland reduced the Yankees' lead to one game by beating Detroit, 4-2, while the Yanks bowed, 3-2, to Washington, the A's swept a two-night doubleheader from the third place Boston Red Sox, 6-1 and 7-5.

The sweep moved the Athletics to within 1 1/2 games of the fading Red Sox and to within six of the Yanks. Six games at this stage of the race is not too big an obstacle to overcome especially when you have a pitcher like Bobby Shantz.

NOT ALONE
Shantz, the major's top winner, is not the only ace Dykes has. Harry Byrd and Carl Scheib are lending a helping hand on the mound while Ferris Fain, Gus Zernial and Eddie Joost are sparking the attack. Fain leads the league in batting with a .337 mark while Zernial is third in the home run derby with 26, only one behind the co-leaders, Yogi Berra of the Yanks and Larry Doby of Cleveland. Zernial also shows the way in runs batted in with 91.

The A's have 28 games left to play including nine with the Yanks and three with Cleveland. They have nine games remaining at home and 19 on the road.

Scheib, who won only one game and lost 12 last year, turned in his 10th victory for the A's in the first game. He permitted only seven hits. Allie Clark and Fain led the A's assault. Clark knocked in three runs on a double and two singles and Fain accounted for a pair with his second home run of the season.

The A's pulled the nightcap out with a three-run rally in the eighth inning. Joost climaxed this game-winning rally with a two-run double off old Al Benton. Starter Charlie Bishop, who bowed out as a pinchhitter in the big eighth, gained his second victory without a loss.

Oretech Grids Open Practice

Labor Day is just that for Oregon Tech football candidates who turn out Monday, 9:30 a.m., for their first workout of the 1952 season.

Coach Rex Hupmaker said twice-daily sessions, 9:30 and 3:30 p.m., would be held for several days. In less than two weeks from their first turnout, the Owls travel to Arcata, Calif., to open the season against Phil Sarboe's Humboldt State Lumberjacks.

The date is Saturday night, Sept. 13. Last year the 'Jacks spoiled Oretech's opening night with a 19-12 victory, one of three defeats suffered by the Owls in a 6-3 season, by far the most successful gridiron campaign ever waged from the mile-high campus.

NUCLEUS

Raiders Turn Out Tuesday

ASHLAND—Coach Alex Petersen announced today that the first practice for the 1952 football season will be held on Tuesday, Sept. 2, at 10:00 a.m. The Red Raiders will have less than 2 weeks to prepare for their opening game Sept. 13, against Linfield College at McMinnville.

Petersen will begin his first year at the helm of Red Raider football replacing Bill Abbey who is in the service.

About 40 veterans and Freshmen are expected to turn out for early drills. The sophomore dominated squad will be working to improve on last year's record, when it won only one game.

"Freshmen are eligible for varsity play and all those interested in football should report Sept. 2," Petersen said.

Petersen has indicated that he will use a single wing style offense, but he pointed out that the exact development of the offense could not be determined until the capabilities of the players had been ascertained.

Ted Schopf, veteran Southern Oregon College basketball and baseball coach, will assist Petersen.

Canadian Title Up For Yanks

VANCOUVER, B. C.—Larry Bouchey, a California giant with a rolling gait and a word for every stroke, tangles today with quiet Bill Campbell in the finals of the 1952 Canadian Amateur Tournament.

No matter which one reaches for the prize after the 36-hole round, this will be the first time since 1949 that the Canadian title has left the dominion, Dick Chapman of Pinehurst, N. C., won it that year.

Up from Huntington, W. Va., to big for the championship, Campbell got himself a 5-up margin yesterday over Sammy Urzetta of East Rochester, N. Y., in the morning half of their 36-hole semifinal. From there on he played it safe and a courageous try by Sammy failed to close the gap, leaving Campbell the winner, 3 and 2.

Bouchey, reaching the heights for the first time in a major tournament, had a tougher job disposing of the methodical Ed Meister of Cleveland, 1 up. He walked and he talked and he kept chumping in the pars until at last he overcame Meister's early 3-up advantage and took over the lead himself in the afternoon round.

McFeters, Hula Pung Clash for Golf Title

PORTLAND, Ore.—The final match for the 1952 Women's National Amateur Golf Championship comes off today, with Honolulu's Mrs. Jacqueline Pung playing a demure, 21-year-old miss from Long Beach, Calif., Shirley McFeters.

The two, brand new to tournament headlines, stroked their way into the title picture yesterday, Mrs. Pung defeating Seattle's Pat Lesser, 6 and 4, and Shirley edging out pert Pat Garner of Midland, Tex., one up on the 20th hole.

FINALISTS
The finalists collided at 36 holes or less at the Waverley Country Club with its 6,323 yards of par 36-37-73 golf. Tee-off time: 11:30, EST.

This is the first national for the Long Beach girl, who stands 5 feet 10, weighs 142 and hits a good long ball.

It's the third national for Mrs. Pung, who is 29 and the mother of two girls aged 19 and 12. She stands 5-3, and weighs 210.

SAD, HURT
It was a different Mrs. Pung who teed off yesterday. Generally jolly, she was sad and admittedly hurt.

She declined to go into detail, and it seems someone—she wouldn't say whom—suggested that she omit a little demonstration she's put on twice this week, a performance asked for by friends in the gallery and cameramen.

HULA
The performance? A few motions of the hula, done native style barefoot.

"I had a heavy burden on my shoulders," said Mrs. Pung. Then, with determination, she added, "but I went out and played golf, and won."
