Victoria Lead Cut To Five

Victoria was still out in front in the Western International League pennant race Friday but its lead was down to five games after a disastrous series against the red hot Spokane Indians.

The Indians, bidding for their second straight pennant, made it three-in-a-row over Victoria Thursday night, edging the Tyes 8-7 in 10 innings. It was Spokane's 11th straight triumph.

The victory left the Indians only a game behind the Tyes in the "win" column but nine games back in the "loss" column, with 11 contests remaining on the schedule.

Spokane is host to last-place Wenatchee for a four-game series starting Friday. Victoria travels to Salem for a similar stand against the fourth-place Senators.

After Wenatchee, Spokane plays third-place Vancouver while Victoria hosts fifth-place Lewiston. The two front-runners wind up their season with a four-game stand at Victoria starting Sept. 11.

Wenatchee played — and lost — its final home game of the season Thursday night, bowing 4-2 to the Yakima Bears, and Vancouver blanked Lewiston 2-0. The latter game—the last one at home for the Bears—was called after five innings because of rain. Rain also washed out the scheduled Tri-City-Salem game at Salem. Lewiston opens at Yakima and Vancouver at Tri-City Friday.

Eddie Murphy's 10th inning single drove in the Indians' winning run at Spokane. Spokane was ahead 7-4 going into the seventh but Chuck Abernathy's three-run homer tied the game at 7 — all. The bases were loaded but two men were out and Murphy had two strikes against him when he whacked out the single scoring Ed Bouchée.

Vic Seixas Upset by Aussie Junior Champ Ken Rosewall

FOREST HILLS (AP)—All on account of a 17-year-old kid, the form chart for the 71st U. S. Singles Tennis Championship today showed a sharp rise in the direction of an all-Australian final for the men's title. And there was a corresponding dip in America's already low prospects of regaining the Davis Cup.

The kid is Ken Rosewall, Australia's junior champion, whose first appearance in the big Forest Hills Stadium was a somewhat breath-taking affair.

Ken not only knocked America's No. 1 player, Vic Seixas of Philadelphia, out of the tournament, 3-6, 6-2, 7-5, 6-7, 6-3, but he showed some 10,000 spectators the kind of tennis they haven't seen from a newcomer in years.

Even those who have been following Rosewall's progress were gasping a bit over the improvement he has made since last winter. And T. E. Richardson of Melbourne, one of the Australian Davis Cup selectors, immediately stamped Ken as a very bright prospect for the team that will defend the trophy next winter.

"It was high grade tennis they played out there," Seixas was giving away points," Richardson said. As for Rosewall's age and inexperience being a handicap, Richardson recalled that Vivian McGrath played Davis Cup tennis while he still was a junior.

Three other Australians, including another 17-year-old, remained in the picture today as the tournament moved into the quarter finals. But none was quite so exciting as Rosewall.

Husky Lewis Hoad, who has been fighting it out with Rosewall for

junior honors in Australia, accomplished yesterday's second-biggest upset when he knocked off the 1950 U. S. champion, Art Larsen of San Leandro, Calif., in straight sets, 6-3, 6-4, 6-4. That wasn't such a big surprise to the fans because Larsen has the habit of playing as erratically as a left-hander is supposed to.

Hoad has to play Frank Sedgman, the No. 1 Australian player and the defending champion here, in today's quarter final.

The rest of the quarterfinal lineup, from bottom to top, is Mervyn Rose of Australia against Dick Savitt of Orange, N. J., sole survivor of the first five seeded Americans; Straight Clark of Pasadena, Calif., upsetter of fourth-seeded Herbie Flam, against 19-year-old Ham Richardson of Baton Rouge, La., and Rosewall against Gardner Mulloy, the Miami, Fla., veteran who beat him at Wimbledon last spring.

Yanks Spoil Shantz' Third Bid for No. 23

Allie Reynolds has achieved two of three feats a pitcher dreams about — a no-hit game and a World Series triumph. Today the 34-year-old New York Yankee right-hander stands a good chance of realizing the third — a 20-win season.

Reynolds, one of the game's best "money pitchers," turned in his 17th victory of the season last night as the Bombers whaled the far out of Bobby Shantz and the Philadelphia Athletics, 12-2. This enabled the Yanks to protect their three-game American League lead over the Cleveland Indians.

The Indians, behind Mike Garcia, had turned back the Detroit Tigers, 3-0, in the afternoon. In other games, Washington defeated Boston, 4-2, and St. Louis trounced Chicago, 6-0.

Brooklyn's National League advantage was sliced to seven

games as the Dodgers dropped a 6-5, 11-inning decision to Boston while the runner-up New York Giants disposed of Philadelphia, 4-3, also in 11-innings. St. Louis turned back Chicago, 1-0, and Cincinnati humiliated Pittsburgh, 7-2.

The Yanks, held to one hit by the A's Harry Byrd Wednesday Yanks shoved three runs home on

night, ripped Shantz and Ed Wright for 13 hits while Reynolds permitted but eight blows.

Reynolds and little Bobby were hooked up in a tight duel for five innings.

Shantz got a taste of what was to come in the sixth when the Yanks, held to one hit by the A's Harry Byrd Wednesday Yanks shoved three runs home on

Yogi Berra's two-run double at Gene Woodling's single. The sixth was a nightmare for the A's as the Yanks rammed home seven runs. McDougald climaxed the fireworks with a three-run homer off Wright. It marked the third time that Shantz has failed to gain his 23rd triumph.
