7 Hurt In Local Wreck

Seven persons were brought to Klamath Valley hospital yesterday afternoon for examination and treatment of injuries received in an automobile accident just south of the Klamath River bridge on US 97.

They were Mrs. Ray Zarosinski and son, Douglas, 22 months old, W. H. Biegel, 77, of McMinnville, and Cisco Frank Todlock, 54, of Stockton all of whom were brought to the hospital by Kaler's ambulance.

Mrs. Joe Zarosinski of Grants Pass and daughters Cathy Jo, 16 months, and Carolyn Jean, 3 years, brought in by the State Police car.

None was seriously hurt.

The Mercury sedan driven by Biegel rammed into the rear end of a Pontiac sedan occupied by the Zarosinskis as the latter was making a turn onto Sutton Road. The Zarosinski car ended up on its top in the ditch alongside the road.

Top Shakespearean Actor Arrives On Movie Scene

HOLLYWOOD—John Gielgud, one of the world's two greatest Shakespearean actors, has been lured to Hollywood. To his own surprise, he likes the town.

Gielgud and Sir Laurence Olivier are the top exponents of Shakespeare. The difference between them is that Gielgud has limited his classic emoting to the stage, whereas Olivier's has also been canned on film. That may or may not account for Gielgud's decision to take an offer to play Cassius in the film version of "Julius Caesar."

At any rate, he is here, and apparently Hollywood turned out to be not the wacky place he expected.

"I find the climate unusually pleasant, the people congenial and the work enjoyable," he remarked on the movie set. "What's more, I have found a house to rent and I don't have to pay a fortune for it."

He explained his reluctance to try movies: "I had a previous experience of doing 'em in England back in the '30s. I was in five or six and they were dismal. I decided that films were not for me."

Scientists OK Space Travel

STUTTGART, Germany UP—A group of scientists who seriously expect man someday to rocket to Mars say that flying saucers may be nothing but optical illusions. And they are not space ships from another planet.

The 200 scientists from 12 countries gathered here for the Third International Astronomical Congress agreed almost unanimously that the "saucers" aren't men from Mars or any other body out in space.

The experts also said they did not believe the reported flying discs were a new weapon—but they did not rule out that possibility completely.

Most of the scientists at the congress said, however, they felt the illusion theory probably was correct.

They also agreed it would take man many more years of research before he can fly rockets into outer space. But they firmly believe travel between the planets will be possible—someday.

NATO Ships Due To Start Maneuvers

OSLO, Norway UP—More than 160 Allied warships including eight big aircraft carriers begin maneuvers off Scandinavia next week, warning Russia that the West is ready to defend the seas even up to the Arctic Circle.

Officially known as "Operation Mainbrace," the 13-day war games will be one of the largest displays of Allied naval might since World War II.

The ostensible purpose of the vast, eight-nation exercise is to give the participating navies an opportunity to co-operate in maneuvers with their North Atlantic Treaty partners.

Military sources said, however, that the games could have two highly important psychological effects:

1. Demonstrate to Newway, Denmark and little Iceland that they can and will be defended, that they are an integral part of NATO and not just an appendage to an organization centered in Europe's vital midsection.
2. Serve notice on Soviet Russia that the Western Allies are fully prepared to resist attack anywhere, even in Arctic waters.

Allied headquarters for Northern Europe, located here in Oslo, announced today that the NATO task force will assemble off Scotland Monday and Tuesday.

The actual maneuvers will begin Saturday, Sept. 13, under the command of Britain's Adm. Sir Patrick Brind, commander in chief of Allied forces in Northern Europe. They will end Sept. 25.

Participating will be ships and planes from the United States, Britain, Canada, Norway, Denmark, France, The Netherlands and Belgium. The fleet will range from battleships like the 45,000-ton USS Wisconsin and Britain's 42,500-ton Vanguard down to small but vital minesweepers.

Eight large carriers from the United States, Britain and Canada will provide the task force's aerial punch. They include two American 45,000-toners, the Midway and the Franklin D. Roosevelt, and two small U. S. flattops, the 27,110-ton Wasp and the 14,500-ton Wright. Britain is sending three carriers as well as many other types of ships.

The Soviet press has, in recent weeks, laid down a heavy campaign against "Mainbrace," describing it as a deliberate provocation.

The Russians are showing more than psychological interest in the naval operations. Danish naval authorities late last month told a number of East German and Polish ships to get out of the port of Frederikshavn—one of the centers of the maneuvers.

A Danish Admiralty official said the Communist commanders "showed a marked and curious interest" in the exercise area.

Seven Russian fishing trawlers anchored Tuesday night off the Danish Faeroe Islands, 400 miles west of Norway. A Danish Admiralty spokesman commented that it "might be the traditional appearance of Russian fishing vessels in waters where the Western navies are staging maneuvers."

State Traffic Deaths Told

SALEM, Ore. UP—The State Traffic Safety Division reported Thursday that the 43 traffic deaths in August had brought the year's total to 271.

The August total was two less than July's, Capt. Walter Lansing, division director said. He added that the 1952 total might equal the 431 of last year.
