USBR Chief (Continued from page 1) have been used as "dummy" bidders to obtain one or more leases for them, thereby negating the veterans preference policy. CASH PAYMENT In one case, he said, bureau investigators found an ex-serviceman was paid \$250 to get a lease for another operator. He said the bureau is doing all possible to stop the "reprehensible practice" and a study is being made of whether criminal prosecutions can be brought. "Many bidders," Boke continued, "living along the Pacific Coast from Los Angeles to Alaska, had no intention of moving to Klamath Falls and gave fictitious local addresses to conceal this fact." "The Reclamation Bureau has an obligation to keep the land under its control in good use," Boke concluded.

COURT ORDER Some of the farmers who stand to lose their crops through the cancellations say they will probably try and get a court order to stymie the bureau's seizures until the potatoes have ripened and been harvested. All the fighting wasn't between the affected farmers and the bureau today. Hard feelings were plainly evident in the Tulelake area with some of the affected ranchers blaming other Tule persons with prompting the bureau investigation. In contrast to the irate feelings of those nipped by the bureau action was the ill-concealed pleasure of some other farmers. "I didn't have anything to do with starting this thing," said one Tule homesteader, "but I'm glad it happened. It's time this mess was cleaned up." He hastily requested his name not be used in connection with the statement.
