## Civil Service Commission Suspends Accused Employee

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Civil Service Commission employee who testified before a grand jury investigating a leak of confidential Loyalty Review Board hearings has been suspended.

The commission Thursday asked U.S. district court here for a copy on her testimony for further study in the case.

The commission named the suspended employee as Miss Miriam M. Dehaas, and said its representatives first questioned her Jan. 16 just 11 days after Senator McCarthy (R-Wis.), made public purported minutes of a Loyalty Review Board hearing.

The review board is the top agency in the government's loyalty program, aimed at ferreting out subversive and disloyal persons out of the government, and functions under the Civil Service Commission. Its deliberations are secret.

"They've hanged the wrong person," McCarthy commented when told in Milwaukee of Miss Dehaas' suspension. He denied she gave him any information, but said he "would have been glad to use her help if I had known she was inclined against the Communists."

McCarthy added: "This accused person positively gave me no information, although it is possible that I met her at a gathering in New York a couple of years ago. The name is somewhat familiar."

Civil Service Commission Chairman Robert Ramspeck and Commissioners Frances Perkins and James M. Mitchell signed the petition for a copy of Miss Dehaas' grand jury testimony.

Gov. John S. Fine of Pennsylvania had started out with an introduction but his voice was drowned out by roars as Eisenhower stepped from the wings of the stage with a big smile on his face.

Eisenhower lost no time in lashing out at the Democratic administration. He set the crowd to cheering by saying: "I have said and will say again and again that there is only one issue in this campaign. That issue is the mess in Washington."

Then Eisenhower charged the administration "has bungled us perilously close to world war II." He said, "We will dedicate ourselves to a program for peace aimed to prevent future Korean and the honorable end of this Korean War."

MT. POCONO, Pa. (AP) — A top government manpower policymaker said today the nation may have to keep at least 3,700,000 men under arms for the next ten to 20 years because of the threat of Communism.

Chairman Arthur S. Flemming of the Defense Mobilization Manpower Committee said that to maintain the armed forces at this level it would be necessary for all qualified men between 18 1/2 to 29 years of age to be liable for two years of service.
