LIVESTOCK

CHICAGO (U)—Hog prices declined this week despite small receipts, barrows and gilts losing 35 to 50 cents. Sows held steady to 50 cents higher. The advance being scored by relatively scarce hogs, scaling more than 50 pounds.

Behind the live hog price drop, which sent quotations to the lowest level since last May, was a decline for the third straight week in wholesale pork quotations.

In addition, shipper demand continued seasonally narrow as orders shifted to markets receiving a larger volume of light weights.

Cattle receipts for the week were among the largest of the year. There was a good demand for choice and prime steers, which held steady to only 50 cents lower, but on steers grading good and below prices tumbled 50 cents to \$1.00.

Cheer and prime native lambs closed about 25 cents under last week. Cull and average good natives lost 50 cents. Receipts increased and dressed lamb prices in the east declined.

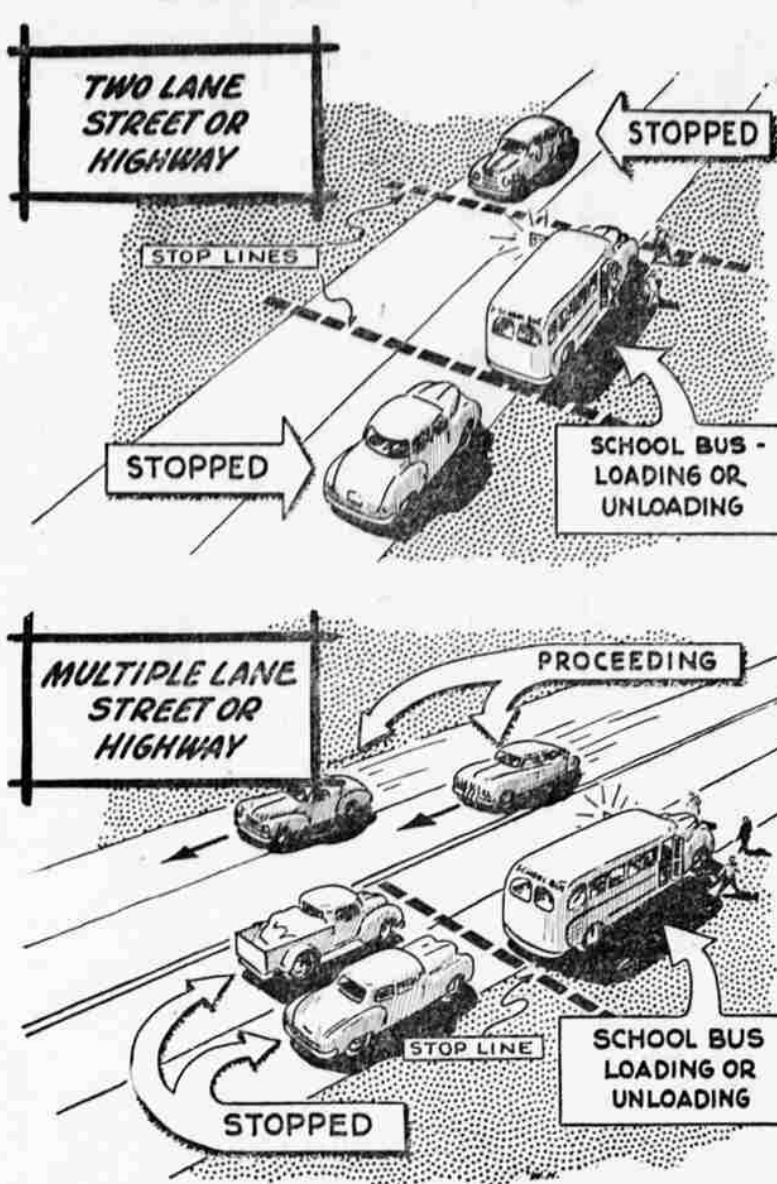

STOP FOR SCHOOL BUSES!



Still confused about Oregon's school bus stop law? This is the way it works. On a two-lane roadway, you must stop when meeting or overtaking a school bus which has halted to load or unload children. On roadways having three or more lanes, you must stop only if you're traveling in the same direction as the bus. After having stopped, you must not proceed as long as any children are leaving the bus or crossing the roadway. To assist in holding traffic while children are crossing the road, all buses are equipped with red stop signal arms. You must stop for the bus whether or not the stop arm is displayed. Use of this signal by the bus driver simply indicates the situation requires you to remain stopped. The law applies equally to city streets and rural roads and highways.

Bend Company Sets Record

Scoring bids, running pine stumpage to a record high, prevented a Klamath Falls lumber firm from tapping timber in the theoretical Bend working circle this week.

The Palmerton Lumber Company, bidding on an estimated 21,700,000 board feet of Deschutes National Forest pine in the Royce Mountain area in northern Klamath County, lost out to Brooks-Scanlon Inc. of Bend.

The timber is located along and back of Oregon 58, the Willamette highway, due west of Cres-Del about 100 miles from here and a shorter distance from Bend.

Brooks-Scanlon's winning bid was \$50.50 a thousand feet. The Palmerton final bid was \$50.25, and a third firm bidding, Gilchrist Timber Company of Gilchrist, dropped out at \$44.

In addition to the bid price, a charge of \$2.75 a thousand for slash disposal is made, and the contracting company will have to spend somewhere around \$150,000 building roads. Altogether, the timber stumpage price will come to around \$56 a thousand before the cutting starts.

The most recent record price was \$31, bid last spring for a giant stand of Klamath Indian reservation pine by the Klamath Basin Pine Mills.

Failure of the Palmerton firm to get the timber means that it will go to Bend for milling. That company several years ago crept into the so-called Roseburg cutting circle by purchasing a big stand of timber above Diamond Lake, near Roseburg than to Klamath Falls, and bringing it here for milling.

Brooks-Scanlon, the firm that bought out Shevlin-Hixson last year, will pay approximately \$1,247,000 for the timber at its bid rate.

Dr. Condon Says He's Been Cleared

CHICAGO (U)—A former top government scientist once labeled "the weakest link in our atomic security chain" says he has "cleared" himself before the House Un-American Activities Committee.

After six hours of intensive questioning yesterday, Dr. Edward U. Condon—head of the National Bureau of Standards for nearly six years—said:

"This could have been cleared up if it was done four years ago—but better late than never."

Rep. Jackson (R-Calif.), a committee member, said the group may have a report ready when it resumes hearing in Washington Oct. 16.

Condon's testimony ended four days of hearings by the committee which at times was protected by guards armed with riot guns following a disturbance Tuesday when jeering, chanting pickets attempted to enter the crowded hearing room in the U. S. courthouse.

Condon—while admitting association with men named in testimony before the committee—denied that he was ever a Communist, had ever consciously known a Communist, or had violated government security regulations in any manner.

Jackson commented:

"Condon's testimony was a relief. It looks like they just decided to cancel any lease that Adams had anything to do with," he said.
