Zion Lutheran Womens' Guild

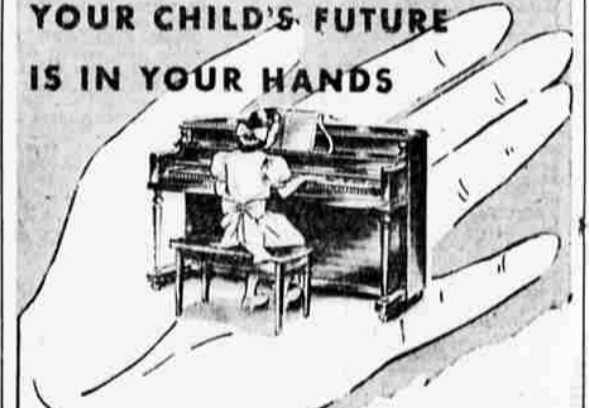
