MERRILL—First day registration at Merrill schools show a gain at the elementary school, and a slight drop at the high school. 201 children reported at the grade school, the largest first day registration in several years. 46 of this number were first graders. At the high school 133 were registered in the six grades there. Enrollment figures at both schools are expected to increase slightly in the next few weeks. Teaching staffs at both schools are virtually the same as last year. Miss Helen Rambo is new on the high school staff, and Mrs. Anna Schultz is the new addition to the grade school roster. She will assist principal Harvey Denham with the 6th grade and teach music. Mr. and Mrs. Harry Kanelmeyer have returned after a year's absence. Mrs. Kanelmeyer has the second grade, and Mr. Kanelmeyer is teaching at the high school. Rounding out the elementary school staff are Mrs. Margaret McNulty and Mrs. Gail Hollander, 1st grade; Wilma Blackman, 3rd; Irene Behnke, 4th; and Don Crawford, 5th. The high school faculty includes Supt. Harold Hendrickson, Raymond Rader, Orville and Nancy Adams and Rosemary Crawford. New science and home economics equipment has been purchased, and chemistry has been added to the list of subjects at the high school. Several of the rooms at the high school were painted, the woodwork varnished, and the interior of the gym painted a lighter color. At the elementary school a new lawn was planted during the summer months, and a general cleaning program carried out. On the opening day of school students were assigned rooms and classes. The cafeteria operated with the same staff as last year; Mrs. Frances Fox, cook, assisted by Mr. J. P. Bell and Mrs. William Poe.

### More Students At Chiloquin

CHILOQUIN—Twenty-one more students had enrolled in the lower six grades in the first two days of school this term than were registered at the end of four weeks last year. Two hundred forty youngsters are in the first 6 grades according to principal Melvin Ray. Joseph Mercer, high school principal, tallied the students enrolled as follows: exactly the same totals as at the end of the fourth week of school last year, 77 in the 7th and 8th grades, 76 in the upper four grades. The 7th grade has 46, 8th—35, 9th—25, 10th—14, 11th—19, and 14 in the 12th grade. The teaching assignments are as follows: Mrs. Harry Whiting and Mrs. Helen Montgomery will divide the 54 first graders between them (including two sets of twin girls, each set named Sharon and Karen, Chase and Zamudio are their last names). Mrs. James Parsley, second grade. Mrs. Athel Rover, third grade. Mrs. George Hobbs, second and third grade combination. Mrs. Les Hoback, fourth grade. Mrs. Sam Rife, fifth grade. Mr. Ray, sixth grade. Mrs. Roblin Pfeiffer will have no home room but will work with both fifth and sixth graders. In the upper building Margaret Molitor is 7th grade home room teacher. Mrs. Henry Spicer, 8th grade instructor and physical education for the high school girls. Frank DiFilio teaches social studies

and is coach. George Hobbs manages the manual training courses, 9th grade science and assists in boys' physical education. Mary Dacey teaches music and home economics. Gene Marchington teaches science and math. James Huff teaches English. Mrs. Frank Bell instructs the commercial subjects and acts as school librarian. Mr. Mercer teaches two courses in addition to his job as local superintendent. His classes are senior English and senior social economics. Buses are following the same routes and with the same drivers as last year. Mrs. Sidney Martin on the Fort Klamath, Klamath Agency run, Mrs. Roblin Pfeiffer, the Soraxie River route, and Reno Barnes the Agency Lake shore, Williamson River and Modoc Point run. Rev. and Mrs. Harvey Zeller are cooking for the cafeteria again this year with help from Mrs. Sidney Martin and Mrs. Paul Johnson. Louie Adams and Elbert Broser are custodians of the buildings. The buildings have been repainted a cream color, floors revarnished and numerous repair jobs have been completed.

### OFL Opposes 5 Measures

PORTLAND—The Oregon State Federation of Labor has recommended that Oregon voters approve all but five measures which are to appear on the November election ballot. The AFL also announced its recommendations for congressional and state offices. The unions' recommendation on the presidency will not be announced until after the national AFL convention. Recommendations included: State officials: Secretary of state, Edith Green, Democrat; state treasurer and attorney general, no recommendation. Congress: First district, Robert B. Jones, Democrat; second district, John G. Jones, Democrat; Third District, Rep. Homer Angel, Republican; Fourth District, no recommendation. The five measures on which a "no" vote was recommended: Cigarette sales tax, property tax limitation, appointive state superintendent of public instruction, repeal of the milk control law, and prohibition of pari-mutuel betting.

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
