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PMA Ballot Deadline Set

The Production and Marketing Administration has set Sept. 12 as deadline for the mailing in of ballots to the local PMA office for the election of farm committee officers, according to County Chairman William Burnett.

A postmark later than the deadline date, Burnett said, will mean the ballot will not be counted. The ballots have been mailed all local farmers who are known to be eligible to vote in the PMA election.

Eligible farmers who have not yet received ballots should notify the PMA committee, which has offices in the Tower Theater building on 8th Street.

Elections will name three farmers to serve as members of a community PMA committee, a delegate from each community going to the county convention where a county committee and alternates will be chosen.

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K.M.H.S. Highlights

Last Wednesday night a short paragraph appeared in this column about the increase in student body card prices. The paragraph said that the increase in price addressed the cost of insurance to be reduced from \$7.50 to \$1.50 for football and other like reductions in other insurance costs. That was not exactly right.

The insurance rates were reduced, but because there was enough already in the athletic fund. In past years the school athletic fund paid for the insurance but in the past three or four years they have not been paying insurance since it caused the fund to run in the red.

Mr. Peak, athletic director, said that the extra dollar in the card prices was to go into the athletic fund as admission to games and explained it this way.

Last year the athletic fund got about \$900 from student body card sales. This money was gone before two football games were played away from home.

When one figures all the sports and all the teams, Pelicans, JV's, Wildcats, and Freshmen, the admission price to the games was a little more than 2 cents per game.

If the price of the student body cards still seems high consider Medford where the price of the card is \$15 and every one must have one.

Last Saturday night the Pelicans chose sides and went through a half game scrimmage, giving the coaches a chance to look the team over. The game ended in a 7 to 7 deadlock at the finish of the scrimmage.
