Victoria Looks Like Shoo-in

The Western International League rolls into the final week of the 1952 baseball season Monday with Victoria still in the driver's seat, the pennant all but in the bag.

LAST STAND

PC Clubs In Sunday Splits

Each Pacific Coast League team won a game Sunday. And each lost one. So everything remained unchanged as far as the pennant race is concerned. Hollywood, the leader, retains its 4 1/2 game bulge over Oakland after splitting a pair with Portland.

It was Fred Haney's day at Gilmore Stadium. The Hollywood manager got a station wagon and a host of other gifts. The Stars won the opener for him 8-0. Mel Queen scattering five hits—his fifth shut-out of the year.

BEVOS WIN

But Portland came back in the nightcap with a 5-3 decision, the Stars annexing the series three games to one. Royce Lint pitched four-hit ball for the Beavers.

San Francisco beat Seattle 5-1 in their opener and bowed 4-2 in the 10-inning finale. The second game was scheduled for seven innings.

The Seals' Elmer Singleton colored the Rainiers in the first game. And Frank Kalin's two-run homer in the third inning proved to be all the Seals needed to win.

Greene Asks Support Of Small Ring Clubs

MONTREAL (AP) — A strong appeal for financial support for small boxing clubs was voiced Monday by Commissioner Abe J. Greene of Paterson, N. J., in his annual report to the National Boxing Association.

Greene told the some 300 delegates the increasingly tight hold on major boxing promotions exercised by the International Boxing Club and two major U. S. Television chains "was tightening the noose around the fight clubs which have in the past spawned the great champions in ring history."

Unless support is given, he predicted that within two years every major promotion of any kind will be tied to the co-axial cables.

"Furthermore," he said, "this gradual expansion of major boxing as a television spectacle will not be long in reaching the stage where the sponsors in control, whether it be the IBC or other promoters, will shut down on home television and force them into special theaters at so much per head. This will be sight control through a virtual boxing super-state."

Shriners Drop Pear Bowl Tilt

MEDFORD, Ore. (AP) — Because of rising costs and declining gate receipts, the Shrine lodge has cancelled its sponsorship of the Pear Bowl football game here, Eugene Tardy of Grants Pass said Sunday.

The game annually matches the champions of the Far West and Northwest Conferences.

Tardy said there was declining interest in the game because teams have not been evenly matched in recent years. The Northwest Conference has won the last three games.

The Shrine has sponsored the game for the last three years, donating receipts to the Shrine Hospital for Crippled Children in Portland.

Queens Snare Crown

PORTLAND (AP) — The Phoenix, Ariz., A-1 Queens defeated the Portland Ey Lind Florists 4-3 in an extra inning game Sunday night to win the Invitational Women's World Softball Tournament.

The Portland team had advanced to the finals Sunday afternoon by blanking the Seattle Epicures 7-0.

Muggsy Dobson, who led the Portland hitting attack with a double and a single off Seattle pitcher Alice Jorgensen in the afternoon game, was named outstanding player of the tournament.

Charlotta Armstrong, who pitched all four Phoenix victories in the eight-day tournament, batted in the winning run in the title game.

The 30-year-old Toledo star, who has won every major amateur crown on the books except the U. S. National, grabbed the Western championship in 1946, 1949 and 1951. He is exempt from qualifying.

A record field of 231 will shoot for a place in the 64-man match play bracket in 18 holes trials Monday and Tuesday.

Second place went to Montgomery's Pal, a Chesapeake female owned by Phelma Montgomery, Klamath Falls, Ore., and handled by her husband, Pat.

Tar Baby of Holly Hill, a Labrador owned by Edward L. Minoggie, Beaverton, Ore., was third.
