CHICAGO (U. S. A.)—Hog trading did an abrupt about face Tuesday after starting with prospects of a steady to 15 cent higher market in a slow opening trade, most sales turned 15 to 25 cents lower.

Cattle were steady to 50 cents lower and sheep had no sales during much of the session.

Most butcher weight hogs sold from \$15.50 to \$20.35. The practical top was \$20.50 on one load although a short load stepped out to \$20.55. Sows were sold at \$15.50 to \$18.00 mostly, a few getting up to \$19.25.

Choice and prime steers and yearlings sold from \$31.00 to \$35.50 and good to low prime heifers from \$27.00 to \$34.00.

Cows remained at \$20.00 downward, bulls at \$23.50 and below, and vealers testing choice brought up to \$33.00.

The sheep run was about a fourth larger than forecast and this brought out lower bids and retarded trading.

Little Shevlin Moves Again

Klamath County's migratory town has moved once again.

The little logging camp-town of Shevlin now is located about six miles north of Gilchrist, just east of US 97 near the service station and auto court known as The Timbers, in the far northern end of the county.

The move was completed last week, four train loads of buildings transported by the Great Northern Railway and some by truck.

For the past three years Shevlin has been located deeper in Klamath County, east of Chemult. Before that it was located at an old stage station site on the Silver Lake road, and as one time it was in Deschutes County.

The town follows the timber.

Last weeks Brooks Scanlon Inc., Bend lumber company, bought a big stand of Deschutes National Forest timber known as the Royce Mountain logging unit, and the intention is to log that stand from the new townsite.

The company is setting up 42 houses for families at the new Shevlin location, plus bunkhouses, cook shack and other community buildings.

Brooks-Scanlon bought out the Shevlin-Hixon Lumber Company about two years ago, and thereby gained ownership of the town of Shevlin.

strict for Sen. Taft prior to the convention, joined in the accolades to the general.

A number of Republicans attending the three-day meeting said they were impressed by the general's forceful comments and a tribute he gave to Sen. Taft.

Eisenhower lashed out at the Democratic administration as a "damnable octopus" and hit at "left-wingish, pinkish" influences. But he drew his greatest applause when he said Taft's friends in supporting him, were by no means abandoning their loyalty to the senator.

Eisenhower said: "There are among you people who very rightfully have given their personal loyalty in the political world to another person. To the senator, for example, you have given a loyalty—Sen. Taft—which places him in your estimation at the top of the whole political heap, and I advise you that's exactly where you ought to keep him."

"I merely want to observe that because you have chosen for yourself to express your in the highest places, has not been given a particular assignment, is no reason for any diminution in that loyalty. You stick right with it. That is exactly what you should do, in my book."

Eisenhower made it plain before heading into Indiana that he would ask voters to "support the Republican team," including Sen. William Jenner, who has called Gen. George C. Marshall a "front man for traitors." Jenner is seeking re-election.

Eisenhower has termed Marshall "a perfect example of patriotism," but indicated he would back Jenner as a matter of Republican party solidarity.
